way, west of Winona. No part to be spent east of that point. \$35,000 on the Williams and Grand Canyon Road; \$45,000 on the Tonto Basin Road and \$20,000 on the Verde Road, and

It is further ordered, that all work be let by contract and that same be under the supervision of a Highway Commission composed as follows: Thos. Maddock, chairman, T. A. Rlordan and Dr. P. A. Melick, members, and

It is further ordered, that permanent roads be built and that all expenditures be made according to the best judgment of the commission of the roads above designated.

By the unanimous action of the Board, the following resolution was ordered spread upon the minutes as of the 3rd day of January, 1916.

Whereas, the state examiner of Arizona having recommended to the Board a system of accounting for roads, which is to be used uniformly through the state,

Now therefore, it is ordered that this system as set forth in blue print on file in this office, be and is hereby adopted as the system to be used by this county, beginning January 1st, 1916, and

It is further ordered, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be instructed to draw orders as set forth in said plans, said order being form No. 5 on said plans, in payment of all labor done and performed on the roads in this county, and the County Treasurer is hereby instructed and authorized to honor and pay these orders as they are presented to him, afterwards attaching these orders to a regular road demand against the county to be presented to the Board at its regular monthly meeting, for his re-imbursement.

Upon motion, the Board adjourned till Wednesday, April 5th, 1916.

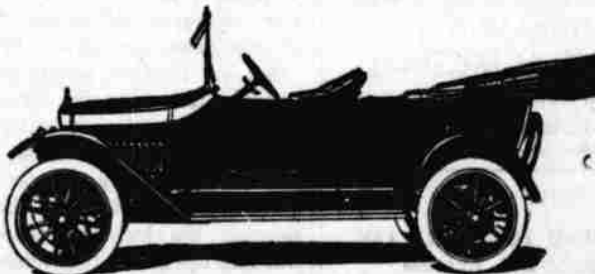
