



CONTRACT LET FOR POST OFFICE BUILDING

The contract for the new post office building to be erected on San Francisco street, was let to the firm of Edwards & Wilkey, of Los Angeles, Saturday afternoon and work on the excavation will soon begin.

L. E. Dickison, chief engineer for Edwards & Wilkey, was in Flagstaff Saturday and will have charge of the construction of the new building. He has just completed a school building at Kingman and one at Winslow. Albert C. Martin, the architect who drew the plans, was also here from Los Angeles when the contract was let.

The new building will be absolutely fire proof, the material used in construction, which was ordered by wire after the contract was awarded, will be reinforced concrete and the front terra cotta. The fixtures for the post office will be all steel and will include something over 1000 mail boxes. The building will front on San Francisco street, running against and parallel with the switch track in the alley. It will be 54 feet of front and 48 feet depth, with a 13 foot basement, and 14 foot ceiling.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN JOINS THE FLAGSTAFF HOME GUARD

Responding to the invitation of the officers and men of the Flagstaff Home Guard several new recruits have shown up for drill during the past two weeks. Notable among the new men is Benjamin Doney, the well known civil war veteran living in Doney Park. Mr. Doney answered the call of his country many years ago and would gladly do so again were men of his age taken, but he is showing his patriotism by lining up with the home guard and doing his bit.

The guard is in need of more men and unless the men of Flagstaff are willing to give two hours a week to drill in its ranks, the guard will most certainly die; mourned only by the officers who have given a great deal of their time to make the organization possible. Its death would be mourned by the whole town and county, however, should an occasion arise where a large body of men are needed quickly. Such a condition is possible and this is a time to look to preparedness.

The guard is still assembling every Monday and Thursday evening at 7 o'clock in the rear of the Babbitt garage, the invitation for new recruits is still extended and the old members who have dropped from the ranks are urged to take up the drill again. Be there next Monday night at 7 or as near that time as possible.

They enjoyed an auto trip to the Cliff Dwellings in Walnut Canyon before leaving for their new home.

FARM LOAN ASSN. NOW PERMANENT ORGANIZATION

At the meeting held in the court house last Saturday afternoon a permanent organization of the Coconino county National Farm Loan Association was effected. Attorney G. T. Wall was elected secretary and treasurer, a board of directors and an appraising board was also elected.

All land belonging to the members of the association will be appraised immediately, but before a loan can be made on the land the government appraiser will go over the ground. The business of the association will be conducted through a National Farm Loan Bank at Berkeley, California.

GRAND CANYON SELECTED FOR NEXT TAX CONVENTION

Supervisors Woolfolk and Garing, Assessor Dunn and Deputy Assessor Joe Higginbotham returned Saturday from Nogales where they attended the state tax convention. The comparing of the tax rolls and other routine business took up the entire session. Grand Canyon was chosen as the place for the meeting next year which will be held on the third Monday in July.

APPEAL BOARDS MET MONDAY TO ORGANIZE

The district appeal boards whose members were appointed by President Wilson and which organizations are the courts of last resort in deciding the liability of a man for service in the national army, met for the first time Monday for organization.

There are two district appeal boards in Arizona, representing two districts, the headquarters of which are at Phoenix and Tucson. District No. 1 includes the counties of Apache, Coconino, Maricopa, Mohave, Navajo, Pinal, Yavapai and Yuma. The board of this district is composed of the following: Captain J. L. B. Alexander of Phoenix, attorney; L. S. Cates, general manager of the Ray Consolidated Mining company at Ray; Bert Davis of Phoenix, former president of the State Federation of Labor; Dr. R. N. Looney of Prescott, former state health officer; Lin B. Orme of Phoenix, former Maricopa county supervisor, prominent rancher. Headquarters of this district will be at Phoenix, at which place all the sessions of the board will be held.

District No. 2 includes the counties of Cochise, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Pima and Santa Cruz. The members of the board of this district are as follows: Dr. John E. Bacon of Miami, former state senator; D. H. Claridge of Solomonville, former state senator and a rancher; J. B. Compton, labor leader; G. H. Dowell, Bisbee, mine superintendent Copper Queen Consolidated Mining company; John B. Wright, Tucson, former territorial attorney general. Headquarters of this district board is in Tucson, where all sessions will be held.

ENGINEERS ARE WORKING ON PLANS FOR SEWER SYSTEM

The field work on the proposed sewer system for Flagstaff has been completed and the firm of Olmstead & Gillen, of Los Angeles, is now drawing up the plat for the district. City Engineer Brooks is expecting a return of the plat at any time for final checking and when this is done everything will be ready for the letting of the contract. The money from the sale of the bonds is now on hand and as the bonds are now drawing interest the council will act promptly in letting the contract so that an incoming revenue may sooner be realized.

NORMAL TO GET WATER FROM OLD TOWN SPRING

Through an agreement recently made between the town council and the Normal school, the water from the Old Town spring will be piped to the Normal grounds and used in irrigating a lawn on the campus and the 40 acres of agricultural lands owned by the school.

If the plan of the Normal board is approved by the board of control the Northern Arizona Normal school grounds will be a beauty spot in this part of the state. Beside the planting of a large lawn, a fence is being planned for the school grounds with a view to preventing trespass and as a protection for the lawn.

GERMAN CITIZEN INTERNED

Douglas, Arizona, July 30.—John Wagner, a butcher, an unnaturalized German who was arrested here recently charged with having government property in his possession, was ordered today by a telegram from the department of justice to be interned at Nogales, Ariz., for the period of the war as an alien enemy. The charge pending against him will be dismissed. Wagner admits he served in the German army before coming to this country in 1904.

Wagner was arrested in Douglas several weeks ago by federal authorities and charged with selling liquor to the soldiers. It is likely that he will be tried for this offense after the war. He is well known in Flagstaff, having lived here several years prior to his going to the southern part of the state.

Say Enemy Aeroplanes Fly Over Utah Nightly and Ask for U. S. Aid

Satisfied that enemy aeroplanes have been flying over southern Utah, Leon Bone, special investigator for the department of justice, has asked that the war department send aeroplanes to the reports which have come from the reports which have come from San Juan and Grand counties as to nightly flights of aeroplanes. Bone said that it is impossible for persons on foot to determine the headquarters of the aeroplanes.

DRAFTED MEN WILL REPORT AT COURT ROOM AUGUST 9TH

Work on Compiling List Going Ahead Slowly to Avoid Mistakes in Numbers—List Checked Several Times—Men to Report at the Court Room—Date will be Specified in Notices Mailed

The tabulation of the names of Coconino county men who are subject to the selective draft is well under way, and it is understood that notices to appear before the local board will be mailed about Saturday. The quota for Coconino county is 59 men and to secure this number for the national army the board will probably mail notices to the first 150 men on the list. If the notices are mailed Saturday, 50 men will be notified to report to the board on August 9th, 50 men on the 10th and 50 men on the 11th. The notices will state the date and time for you to appear for examination.

Should the 150 names not produce enough men to fill the quota, additional men will be notified to appear for examination in the order in which they stand in the drawing. The call will continue to issue from the local board until the quota of 59 men has been filled. Just what percentage will be required to fill the quota is difficult to determine, but owing to the large numbers of Mexicans registered who are not citizens, it is probable that 250 men will be called to get the required 59. This is merely a conjecture based upon the number of aliens and probable exemptions on the list.

The only law covering the number of names to be drawn simply states that at least 200% of the quota required must be notified, then the board may use their discretion in calling more names. In any case, however, men will be examined and accepted in the order in which their numbers were drawn in the draft, and in all cases the persons notified to appear before the board will have at least five days to do so.

The following is the form that will be sent to each person summoned to appear before the board:

You are hereby notified that pursuant to the act of Congress approved May 18, 1917, you are called for military service of the United States by this Local Board from among those persons whose registration cards are under the jurisdiction of this Local Board.

You will report at the office of this Local Board for physical examination on the..... day of....., 1917, at..... o'clock A. M.

Any claim for exemption or discharge must be made on forms which may be procured at the office of this Local Board, and must be filed at the office of this Local Board on or before the SEVENTH day after the date of mailing this notice. *Date of mailing notice..... of..... 1917.

Your attention is called to the penalties for violation or evasion of the Selective Service law, approved May 18, 1917, and of the Rules and Regulations made pursuant thereto.

Penalties

Any person who shall make or be a party to the making of any false statement or certificate or liability of himself or any other person for service under the provisions of this act, or regulations made by the President thereunder, or otherwise evades or aids another to evade the requirements of this act or of said regulations, or who, in any manner, shall fail or neglect fully to perform any duty required of him in the execution of this act, shall if not subject to military law, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the district court of the United States having jurisdiction thereof, be punished by imprisonment for not more than one year, or, if subject to military law, shall be tried by court-martial and such punishment as a court-martial may affect. (Sec. 17, approved May 18, 1917.)

If two or more persons conspire either to commit any offense against the United States, or to defraud the United States in any manner or for any purpose, and one or more of such parties do any act to effect the object of the conspiracy, each of the parties to such conspiracy shall be fined not more than \$10,000, or imprisoned not more than two years, or both. (Sec. 37, Criminal Code of United States.)

Whoever, having taken an oath before a competent tribunal, officer, or person, in any case in which a law of the United States authorizes an oath to be administered, that he will testify, declare, depose, or certify truly, or that any written testimony, declaration, deposition, or certificate by

him subscribed, is true, shall wilfully and contrary to such oath state or subscribe any material matter which he does not believe to be true is guilty of perjury, and shall be fined not more than \$2,000 and imprisoned not more than five years. (Sec. 125, Criminal Code of the United States.)

Whoever directly commits any act constituting an offense defined in any law of the United States, or aids, abets, counsels, commands, induces, or procures its commission, is a principal. (Sec. 332, Criminal Code of United States.)

The following list of names shows the serial number of the registrant on the left and the order in which he was drawn on the right. The first fifty men of this list will be notified to appear before the board August 9th, provided the notices are mailed out Saturday, and so on down the list. When the men report at the court room the first man to be examined will be Serial No. 258, Order No. 1, Refugio Contreras, Order No. 2 will follow him, and so on.

It will be noted that there is a number 50 and a number 50a on this list. This was brought about by inserting a name after the list was set up in this office. It will be understood that after number 50, 50a will be the next number called and this number will be followed by 51, or that after number 50a all numbers will be advanced by one.

While every effort has been made to make this list authentic, it should not be taken as final. The only official list is being made up by the board and as yet is not available for publication. The list below will be completed in The Sun next Friday with any corrections that may come from the list below through checking with the official list. However, it is safe to assume that this list below will cover the first draft by a big margin.

Plans are well under way for the third annual Red Lake Barbecue which will be held August 18th in Magee's Wood. There will be athletic sports, cowboy games, racing, dancing and other amusements as well as addresses by prominent Arizonans. Gov. Campbell, Judge Kibbey, Lewis Carpenter, Dr. Von KleinSmidt, G. W. P. Hunt and others have been invited to be present and speak on any subject they choose.

The object of these annual barbecues upon the part of the Red Lake District is not only to afford the public a good old-fashioned time, but also to draw attention to the district as a farming proposition. It is one of the best, if not the best, agricultural districts in Northern Arizona and these people feel amply repaid for their labors and trouble of the public will only come and see what they are doing when the crops are about ready to be harvested.

KERLEY LOSES ROOF

J. P. Kerley was in from his trading post at Tolchaco Monday buying material to repair the roof of his store which was taken off during the big storm last week. Kerley says that the wind lifted the roof off and carried it about half a mile and that the occupants of the store did not know anything about it until an Indian came in and notified them that they were roofless.

Mr. Kerley is in from a trip over the western and northern end of the Navajo reservation, which he made in company with Dr. Wilson, of Tuba. The trip was made for the purpose of vaccinating the Indians against smallpox which is causing considerable trouble in the eastern end of the reservation. He says the Indians welcomed the vaccination as they had been advised by some of the older men that years ago a smallpox epidemic swept over the reservation and all Indians who submitted to the vaccination were immune.

CATTLE GROWERS HOLD MEETING

The annual meeting of the Coconino Cattle Growers Association was held in the Empress theatre Wednesday afternoon with a good attendance from over Northern Arizona. Officers for the following year were elected as follows: E. H. Crabb, President; John Zalaha, Vice-President; T. E. McCullough, Secretary and Treasurer.

No changes were made in the advisory boards for Coconino and Tuzayan National Forests. The executive committee will also remain the same for another year.

The meeting endorsed Bowser Connors for the appointment as county ranger by the board of supervisors. Mr. Connors has an enviable record as an officer of the law, having served for eight years as sheriff at Spurr, Texas.

An effort will be made to secure the supervision of the scales at the Flagstaff stock yards, as well as the privilege of keeping them in good repair and working order.

The spread of the loco weed was the subject of considerable discussion, in which forest service officials gave a report on the progress made with the extermination of the plant. Mr. Cavanaugh, of the bureau of entomology, stated that the government department has been working to discover a bug which will get to the roots of the weed and destroy it. This seems to be the only solution to the problem, as efforts to grub it out has proved futile, as proved by extensive effort along this line in New Mexico.

A rate schedule for animals killed on railroad right of ways was submitted to the meeting and was approved with the exception of the amount allowed on 3 year old steers. The amount allowed is \$57.50, while it was pointed out that the value of such an animal is from \$65 to \$70.

A resolution protesting against the Gore amendment was passed and Arizona's representatives in congress will receive a copy of the resolution. The Gore amendment makes it unlawful to ship to any slaughter market cows and calves or breeding stock with the idea of increasing the production of meat. In view of the present range conditions this law would handicap the cattle growers in this section by overstocking the range which is carrying all the grazing possible.

TOM BRADY PASSES AWAY

Thomas M. Brady, well known resident of Flagstaff and Coconino county, passed away at the county hospital Sunday after a long illness from uremia. The funeral services were held in the Flagstaff undertaking parlors Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock, and interment made in the Flagstaff cemetery.

Thomas Brady was born in Tiplin county, Mississippi, April 27th, 1853. He has been a resident of Coconino county for the last 20 years and has many old time friends who will mourn his passing.

CONSERVATION OF YOUNG MEATS WORKS HARSHIP

The following letter is self explanatory and is the outcome of the attempt to stop the service of lamb on dining cars. Arizona Wool Growers are registering a protest to our senators and congressman, and to the presidents of the dining car service.

Coconino Sun, Flagstaff, Arizona.

Gentlemen: We have been advised that a sentiment is being agitated attempting to stop the service of lamb on dining cars.

This Association protests against this measure, as being inadvertently unpatriotic and inimical to the best interests of the nation ultimately.

In Arizona as Department of Agriculture and Forestry statistics will confirm, the range is taken up, if not overstocked, therefore to supplement the mature ewe with the lamb will leave a lapse of a full year in the reproduction period. It is well known that the mature animals are more prolific in offering than the lamb.

Range conditions in the Northwest and Southwest are similar to Arizona, in the sense that they are overstocked. It is true in the middle West and East supply can be increased by placing sheep in small herds upon thousands of farms, however, it is prior to this readjustment period that the shortage will be acute and it is obvious that a decrease rather than increase in the meat and wool supply will be incurred at the most critical time.
