The charge pending against him will be dismissed. Wagner admits he served in the German army before coming to this country in 1904.

Wagner was arrested in Douglas several weeks ago by federal authorities and charged with selling liquor to the soldiers. It is likely that he will be tried for this offense after the war. He is well known in Flagstaff, having lived here several years prior to his going to the southern part of the state.
