3 MAJOR EVENTS IN COUNTY TOMORROW

PAGEANTRY, ORATORY, WILL FEATURE DEDICATION OF DE NIZA MONUMENT AT LOCHIEL

Troops Of Two Nations To Fire Salutes; Governors
Of Arizona And Sonora To Speak, Bishop
Daniel Gercke Main Orator

Pageantry and oratory will feature the program at Lochiel at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning of the dedication of the monument commemorating the memory of Fray Marcos de Niza, discoverer of Arizona, who first stepped on soil of what is now Arizona 400 years ago. American and Mexican soldiers will fire salutes and Governor R.

T. Jones of Arizona and Governor Roman Yocupicio of Sonora will deliver addresses.

The main oration will be delivered by Bishop Daniel Gercke of Tucson, who will trace the epochal exploratory tour of the Franciscan padre who opened the doors of the west four centuries ago to blaze the trail of civilization.

The monument, a handsome concrete marker, is adjacent to the International border line. It is on American soil and can be entered from Mexico or the United States. At one end is a large cross. Inscription plaques in English and Spanish will be inlaid in the floor of the monument.

The construction work on the monument is nearing completion. It is supervised by Rev. Bonaventura Oblasser, chronicler of the quest of Fray Marcos de Niza.

A choir of Pima and Papago Indians will sing. They are descendants of the natives who resided in this section at the time the Franciscan padre made his trek through Arizona.

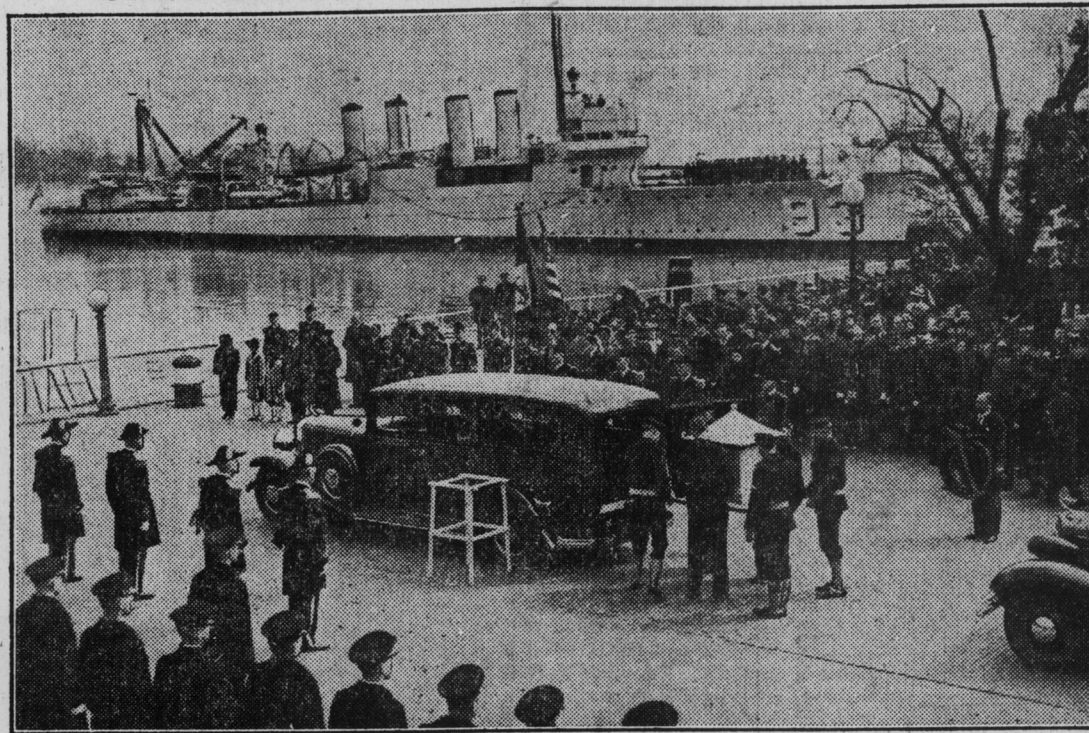

Montezuma Auditorium Opening Set For Two Nights, April 22-23

A scene of beauty throughout—undoubtedly the most elaborate place of its kind ever erected in Arizona.

That's the new Montezuma Auditorium, adjoining the Montezuma Hotel on Morley avenue and formal opening of which will be held two nights—Saturday and Sunday April 22, 23.

The auditorium, constructed at a cost of many thousands of dollars by Wirt G. Bowman, Nogales banker, is entered from the hotel lobby through a large, one-piece mahogany door decorated with a circular, obscure glass panel and set between two columns of glass brick.

"Orchid" Lounge

Through this door you enter the "orchid" lounge, so named from the wall coverings of marlite, the newest of modern wall decorations, set in chrome mouldings. Floor in Hermocillo red tile, lighting fixtures, ceilings with flush fixtures, side lights of lumiline and chrome.

ROTARY CONVENTION, HORSE SHOW AND DEDICATION OF MONUMENT ATTRACT CROWDS

Both Horse Show At Sonoita And Dedication Of Fray
Marcos De Niza Monument At Lochiel To
Get Under Way At 10 A. M.

Three major events will attract hundreds of persons to Santa Cruz County tomorrow.

Topping all so far as the city of Nogales is concerned is the 15th annual convention of the 11th district of Rotary International, opening here tomorrow for a three-day session.

Other events are the annual spring horse show and races at Sonoita and the dedication of the Fray Marcos de Niza monument at Lochiel.

Rotarians Arriving

Rotary District Governor W. R. (Bill) Carty of Needles, California, and wife, reached the city Wednesday night, being the first here for the big convention. They came a few days ahead of time for the purpose of assisting the Nogales Rotarians in adding the finishing touches to the program.

Other Rotarians will begin arriving today. Some will come tonight and the great majority tomorrow, registration day. Also on the program tomorrow is a blind bogey golf tournament and luncheon for visiting Rotary golf players and a Mexican welcome astride the international line at 5 p.m.

Shore Show

The horse show, starting at 10

a.m., and lasting until late in the afternoon, will be held at the county fair grounds. Hundreds of southern Arizona folks are expected to attend.

Dedication

The museum dedication at Lochiel, also set for 10 a.m., is attracting statewide interest and there will undoubtedly be a steady line of cars carrying crowds to Lochiel from the early morning hours until the program opens.

Mission Museum Dedication On Sunday April 23

Dedicatory addresses will be made by Hillary Tolson of Santa Fe, New Mexico, regional director of the National Park Service, and Former Mayor Harry J. Karns of Nogales, at the dedication of the new \$30,000 museum at old Tumacacori Mission, near Tubac on the Nogales-Tucson road.

The dedication will take place at 3 o'clock a week from tomorrow afternoon.

A feature of the program will be the presentation of a cantata, "Mission Bells," by students of the Nogales High School under the direction of Prof. Herman Novick. Monsignor L. Duval will conduct a vesper service and the choir of Sacred Heart Church will sing.

A large crowd from all parts of southern Arizona, and many distant points, is expected to attend the dedication, it was stated yesterday by Louis R. Caywood, custodian of the mission, who added that the new museum, exclusive of exhibits, was erected at a cost of about \$30,000.
