## BOY'S COTTON GROWING CONTEST IS AGITATED

J. B. Griffing of Tempe Normal is at the Head of Movement—Success is Certain

That Tempe means business when it comes to the industry of cotton-growing can be seen by the fact that final steps toward the inauguration of a boys' cotton-growing contest are being taken. Over \$100 in suitable prizes have already been subscribed to help the movement along and arouse competitive interest among the boys of the community.

Professor J. B. Griffing of the department of agriculture of Tempe Normal School has been chosen to organize the boys' clubs, and proposes to begin work immediately. Not only boys from the public high, normal and training schools may compete, but all the boys from outlying districts, including Scottsdale and Kyrene, will be eligible to enter the contest. In order to increase the number of prizes and equalize the opportunities to win, the boys will be divided into two groups, according to age. 10 to 15 years, and 16 to 21 years, respectively. The boys have evidently been expecting such an action for some time, judging by the inquiries that have been received from them, so that a large enrollment in the contest is practically assured.

As far as Tempe is concerned, nothing better could be done to promote intensive farming and spread broadcast the best methods of growing the King of Cotton.

Besides the assistance to be given the boys by Professor Griffing, they will also receive attention from Professor Stanley F. Morse of the University of Arizona Experimental Farm; Professor A. M. McOmie, also connected with the government, and from J. A. Riggin, county superintendent of schools, also heartily in sympathy with the movement. Besides the local prizes that will be given, the boys will be eligible to enter for district, state and national prizes.

Following the play, a night later, there will be a lecture on "Northern Arizona" by Professor Douglas of the University of Arizona. The lecture is to be given on Wednesday evening in place of Thursday evening, as has been advertised, by reason of a similar change made with the appearance of Professor Douglas in Phoenix.

## \$25,000 PAID FOR COTTON

### Final Settlement to Cotton Growers Made Yesterday. Checks Go Out Slowly—Growers Hold Meeting for Membership Campaign

Between twenty and twenty-five thousand dollars was paid out yesterday afternoon to the cotton growers of the Mesa Egyptian Cotton Exchange for their year's crop. This of course does not include the numerous advances that have been made from time to time but is rather the final settlement between the growers and the company. At the same time that the checks were being handed out to all growers, at the cotton exchange office, who called for them, there was a meeting in progress at the city hall called for the purpose of working out some plan whereby the new members, who are anxious to enter the association, may be brought in.

The plan of allowing the members to come in on the same basis as that of last year will probably be adopted. This plan seems to be the most feasible. The meeting was not as well attended as was expected for the reason that the meeting of the stockholders of the Water Users' Association was in progress at the auditorium of the Mesa Union High School Building.

Strange as it may seem, the checks went out rather slowly. The fact that final settlement was to be made was advertised quite thoroughly and it was hoped that all checks would be given out yesterday. Nevertheless at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon there remained a basket full of checks and statements and topping the pile was a check for \$784.25 due a rancher who at that minute was down at the meeting of the Water Users' Association.

The financial part of the program is giving the officers of the exchange no trouble. It is no secret that considerable difficulty was experienced last season in getting any institution to take hold of the loan feature. Now there is a much more encouraging aspect and no trouble will be experienced in financing the crop.

**PEDAGOGUES IN SESSION**  
The regular monthly meeting of the Maricopa County Teachers' Association was held yesterday morning in the Mesa Union High School Building, the regular meeting place in the assembly room having been appropriated by the stockholders of the Water Users' Association. The meeting, attended by seventy-five teachers adjourned shortly after noon to convene next month at the Indian school when the subject of arithmetic will be again considered. The matter which occupied the time of the teachers yesterday was that of the present text books in the schools upon the subject of arithmetic. It was the opinion of a number of the teachers that the present text was insufficient or rather was not ampie to meet the more modern ideas in a proper handling of the most important subject taught in the public schools. While a number of the teachers held to the idea that the texts were not strictly up to the modern idea of teaching arithmetic there were others who lamented the fact that a great percentage of the teachers in the schools today who essay to teach arithmetic are not thoroughly conversant with the intricate details necessary before being thoroughly competent to impart that information to the students. The general discussion was lead by Professor Jensen of the osborn school and Professor Davis of the Alma schools.

**LEGAL NOTICE**  
RESOLUTION NO. 674

A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX, DECLARING THEIR INTENTION TO IMPROVE THE ALLEY IN BLOCK TWENTY-FOUR OF THE ORIGINAL TOWNSITE OF PHOENIX, AND DETERMINING THAT BONDS SHALL BE ISSUED TO REPRESENT THE COSTS AND EXPENSES THEREOF, AND DECLARING THE WORK OR IMPROVEMENT TO BE OF MORE THAN LOCAL OR ORDINARY PUBLIC BENEFIT AND THAT THE COST AND EXPENSE OF SAID WORK SHALL BE ASSESSED UPON A DISTRICT AND PROVIDING THAT THE PROPOSED WORK OR IMPROVEMENT SHALL BE DONE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 1912, AND SUBSEQUENT AMENDMENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix:

Section 1. That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the Common Council of the City of Phoenix to order the following work to be done, to-wit:

1. That the roadway of the alley in Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix, including also private drives, and excepting such portions of said alley as will be occupied by a cement concrete gutter, where shown on the plans hereinafter referred to, be graded and paved with bitulithic pavement.

2. That a cement concrete gutter be built along the center of the alley in Block 24 in the original townsite of Phoenix.

3. That a cement concrete curb be built along both sides of the roadway of the alley in Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix, excepting at the intersection of said roadway with private drives, and excepting where a cement concrete curb has already been built and is in satisfactory condition as shown by the plans hereinafter referred to.

4. All of the above work to be done in accordance with a certain set of plans approved and adopted by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix on the 10 day of March, 1914, and on file in the office of the City Engineer of said city in Book One of Street Improvement Plans or Pages 172 and 173, and in further accordance with Specifications Nos. 19, 20, 21 and 22 of the City of Phoenix on file in the office of the City Recorder of said city, and which said plans and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of the said work and made a part hereof.

Section 2. That the said contemplated work or improvement in the opinion of the Common Council is of more than local or ordinary public benefit and said Common Council hereby make the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district, and hereby declares that the district in said City of Phoenix benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof is described as follows:

All of Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix.

Section 3. The City Engineer is hereby directed to make a diagram of the district described hereinabove in Section 2 of this Resolution of the Common Council to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof. Such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece or parcel of land in said district and the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done.

Section 4. The said Common Council finds that public convenience requires that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses of such work or improvement and said Common Council determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of Twenty-five (25) Dollars or more for costs and expenses of said work or improvement. Said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9)

years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until all is paid and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July, respectively, of each year, at the rate of six (6) percent per annum on all sums unpaid until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid.

Section 5. The serial bonds herein mentioned shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of Arizona, known and designated as the "Improvement Act of 1912," approved May 17, 1912, and all the proceedings in the aforementioned improvements shall also be taken under said "Improvement Act of 1912," and subsequent amendments.

Section 6. The City Recorder shall certify to the passage of this Resolution of Intention, and shall cause the same to be published ten (10) times in the Arizona Republican, a daily newspaper published and circulated in the City of Phoenix and hereby designated for that purpose.

Section 7. The Superintendent of Streets of the City of Phoenix shall post notice of said proposed improvement as required by law, and in said notices shall refer to this Resolution of Intention.

Reference is hereby made to the Bitulithic Mixture License Agreement of Warren Brothers Company of Boston, Mass., dated March 4, 1914, on file in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Phoenix.

I hereby certify that the above and foregoing Resolution No. 674, was duly passed by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix at a meeting held March 10, 1914, and that a quorum was present thereat.
