TRADE BOARD TO HAVE PAPER

Directors Instruct Secretary to Publish Monthly Bulletin in Form of Newspaper Similar to Other Live Cities

The Phoenix Board of Trade will have a regular newspaper. Permission was granted the secretary yesterday to make arrangements for a regular publication, to be issued as the monthly news organ of the board, modeled on the style paper gotten out by boards of trade in other and larger centers, and individualized by the Salt River Valley, Phoenix, and the board of trade. The first issue of the new organ will make its appearance about the first of next month. Beside, there were dozens of other things done by the board at the extra session.

A letter from the governor of the state asking the board of trade to appoint delegates to the Irrigation Congress to be held in Denver next month, was read, and was referred to the Water Users' Association, that body being the proper place for such appointments to emanate from.

The matter of the Corn Club, Cotton Club and other farmers' club, brought up by the University of Arizona, was referred to the Maricopa County Farmers' Institute, and to the principals of the several high schools of this county. The board was asked to lend their assistance in the securing of funds for the clubs, but they did not see that the matter lay in their field of action.

Roosevelt Signs

The directors of the board asked that the secretary rush the bill of the Roosevelt roads that the travelers over the route will be able to know at all times just where they are and how far they are from the nearest garage. The movement is in response to the announcement that the Raymond Whitcomb Tours have arranged to route their trips over the Globe-Phoenix road, and will be in the line of work the board of trade is conducting in making everything easy for the Arizona visitor.

The securing of the Raymond Whitcomb Tours for this part of the state should really be attributed to the board of trade, since they were the first to attract the tours company to this state, and to show them the advantages of the Roosevelt dam from a scenic viewpoint.

LEGAL NOTICE

RESOLUTION NO. 671

A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX, DECLARING THEIR INTENTION TO IMPROVE THE ALLEY IN BLOCK TWENTY-FOUR OF THE ORIGINAL TOWNSITE OF PHOENIX, AND DETERMINING THAT BONDS SHALL BE ISSUED TO REPRESENT THE COSTS AND EXPENSES THEREOF, AND DECLARING THE WORK OR IMPROVEMENT TO BE OF MORE THAN LOCAL OR ORDINARY PUBLIC BENEFIT AND THAT THE COST AND EXPENSE OF SAID WORK SHALL BE ASSESSED UPON A DISTRICT AND PROVIDING THAT THE PROPOSED WORK OR IMPROVEMENT SHALL BE DONE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 1912, AND SUBSEQUENT AMENDMENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix:

Section 1. That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the Common Council of the City of Phoenix to order the following work to be done, to-wit:

1. That the roadway of the alley in Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix, including the alley intersection, and including also private drives, and extending such portions of said alley as will be occupied by a cement concrete gutter, where shown on the plans hereinafter referred to, be graded and paved with bituminous pavement.

2. That a cement concrete gutter be built along the center of the alley in Block 24 in the original townsite of Phoenix.

3. That a cement concrete curb be built along both sides of the roadway of the alley in Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix, excepting at the intersection of said roadway with private drives, and excepting where a cement concrete curb has already been built and is in satisfactory condition as shown by the plans hereinafter referred to.

4. All of the above work to be done in accordance with a certain set of plans approved and adopted by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix on the 10 day of March, 1914, and on file in the office of the City Engineer of said city in Book One of Street Improvement Plans or Pages 172 and 173, and in further accordance with Specifications Nos. 19, 20, 21 and 22 of the City of Phoenix on file in the office of the City Recorder of said city, and which said plans and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of the said work and made a part hereof.

Section 2. That the said contemplated work or improvement in the opinion of the Common Council is of more than local or ordinary public benefit and said Common Council hereby makes the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district, and hereby declares that the district in said City of Phoenix benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof is described as follows:

All of Block Twenty-four (24) of the original townsite of Phoenix.

Section 3. The City Engineer is hereby directed to make a diagram of the district described hereinabove in Section 2 of this Resolution of Intention, to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof. Such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece or parcel of land in said district and the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done.

Section 4. The said Common Council finds that public convenience requires that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses of such work or improvement and said Common Council determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of Twenty-five (25) Dollars or more for the costs and expenses of said work or improvement. Said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until all is paid and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July, respectively, of each year, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum on all sums unpaid until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid.

Section 5. The serial bonds herein mentioned shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of Arizona, known and designated as the "Improvement Act of 1912," approved May 17, 1912, and all the proceedings in the aforementioned improvements shall also be taken under said "Improvement Act of 1912," and subsequent amendments.

Section 6. The City Recorder shall certify to the passage of this Resolution of Intention, and shall cause the same to be published ten (10) times in the Arizona Republican, a daily newspaper published and circulated in the City of Phoenix and hereby designated for that purpose.

Section 7. The Superintendent of Streets of the City of Phoenix shall post notice of said proposed improvement as required by law, and in said notice shall refer to this Resolution of Intention.

Reference is hereby made to the Entitled Mixture License Agreement of Warren Brothers Company of Boston, Mass., dated March 4, 1914, on file in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Phoenix.

I hereby certify that the above and foregoing Resolution No. 671, was duly passed by the Common Council of the City of Phoenix at a meeting held March 10, 1914, and that a quorum was present thereat.
