COTTON ACREAGE IS INCREASED

Boys' Contest for Cotton Growing Now Well Under Way—The Rules

Interest in the boy's cotton growing contest, recently inaugurated by the Tempe Board of Trade, and now under the direct charge of J. B. Griffing, agricultural instructor at the Normal, is becoming more and more manifest daily among the youthful contestants of the community who have signified their intention to enter. During the past week Professor Griffing has visited practically all the schools of the district including Scottsdale, Rohrig, Rural, Kyrene and Jordan, and reports all the necessary enthusiasm among the students to make the contest a success. While the Rural school is the smallest by way of attendance enrollment, that Mr. Griffing had occasion to visit, seven contestants to date have signified their intention to participate from there alone. All of the other institutions will have a much larger representation. But not alone from the schools will the contestants come, the contest is open to every youth of the community within the age limit and many who are not at present attending any school, are set on competing for the honors.

Suitable rules governing the contest have been prepared by Professor Griffing. They are as follows:

1. Contestant must be a club member. There shall be a junior club and senior club. The age limits of the former shall be 10 to 15 years; of the latter, 16 to 21 years, inclusive.
2. Each contestant shall agree to make a special study of sowing, selecting, planting, cultivating and picking cotton.
3. Plot must be one-half acre, rectangular in size. This plot may be part of a larger field which club member is caring for.
4. All work must be done by club members. Exceptions may be made for plowing and planting of cotton, in case same has been done previous to time of enrollment.
5. The half acre must be measured and cotton weighed in the presence of two disinterested freeholders. Affidavit must be presented to the supervisor of the contest.
6. A record of expenses shall be kept and filed at the close of the contest on a blank provided for that purpose.
7. Each contestant must provide a sample of cotton for exhibit at the close of the contest.
8. Each contestant shall submit a written account entitled "How I made my crop of cotton."
9. In estimating profits, 5 per cent interest per acre on the average market value of land in the vicinity shall be charged as rent of land. The work of each contestant shall be charged at 10 cents an hour, and the work of each horse at 5 cents an hour. Manure shall be charged at a rate of \$2.00 for each two-horse load.
10. Enrollment closes June 1st.
11. Each club shall be awarded a first, second and third prize.
12. Prizes shall be awarded on the following basis: Yield per acre, 50 points; profit on investment, 20 points; exhibit, 10 points; reports, 10 points.

He was employed in Phoenix for two years, later coming to this place, where he accepted a position with the Mesa City Bank, which he continued to hold until last October, when his health necessitated a trip to the hospital. He was engaged to Miss Mary Butler, of this place, and the wedding had been set for last November. A husband was in course of erection which was to be the home of the happy young couple, when the fatal illness took a serious turn necessitating medical assistance.

COTTON CONTEST RULES; ENTHUSIASM INCREASES

Careful Canvass by Zanjeros Shows More Than 1,000 Acres Over Estimates of Officers

There are two features which stand out very prominently in the report of the acreage to be planted to cotton this year. One is that the acreage is increasing rapidly from year to year, and the other is that the zanjeros solve the problem of getting at real first hand information concerning the acreage to be devoted to any particular crop. While this duty does not necessarily fall upon the catch rider naturally, yet it is a function that he can perform naturally and without a great deal of trouble, since it is he who comes in direct touch with the farmers and knows just how much of a certain kind of crop they are planting this season. These facts when collected by the several zanjeros and assembled in the local office take on an interesting aspect, and without doubt the idea of determining crop acreages will be determined in this manner in the future.

The matter of increased cotton acreage it should be explained, includes nothing west of the Tempe canal, for that belongs within the boundaries of the Tempe exchange district. However, the acreage otherwise is correct as assigned to each particular canal system.

The acreage is as follows:
Consolidated 5295 acres
Mesa 1626 1/2 acres
Eastern 1884 acres
Tub 338 acres
Indian 25 acres

Total 7578 1/2 acres

While the members of the local exchange were very agreeably surprised at the unexpectedly increased acreage they were also made glad by the report coming from McFadden Brothers that more Mesa cotton had been disposed of at a good figure and that next year there would be no trouble in disposing of every bale that could be grown in the Salt River valley. Such communications are very encouraging to the growers and are of course the means of increasing the acreage. It is believed that not only will the acreage be increased, but that the product will also be increased. The growers profited much by last year's experiences and they will reap the reward for that information gained last year. One item toward that end is the matter of early planting. The crop is reported as a great deal over half in at the present time. Last year hardly any of the growers had commenced to plant and some seed was planted as late as June.
