The regular session of the council does not occur until the following night when the vote will be canvassed. At the Monday night session the apparatus advertised for under the recent resolution of the council as well as the Gamewell fire alarm system submitted to the needs of the town will be the most important business.

The immediate business last night was awarding bids for the construction of the proposed fire houses at Five Point and at the water station. These were awarded at the cost each of \$2463. Further than this the council granted a permit to Campbell's United Shoes to hold their carnival in the city on the same date as the Sells Photo circus and for the balance of the week.

"We must give equal opportunity to the whites and blacks," said the president, "a thing which has long been denied them in the gold mining industry. If the whites refuse to do manual work, when they must accept reasonable wages as skilled overseers, or drop altogether."
