Thomas Drier, Editor of "Associated Advertising," Will Be in City This Morning for Short Stay.

When Thomas Drier, editor of "Associated Advertising," a magazine devoted to admen and their doings, arrives in Phoenix today he will find things prepared for him. The newspapermen of the city will take him in hand and let him into all the secrets of the valley's prosperity, via the luncheon and automobile ride routes. First he will be feted at the Adams with a Salt River valley meal, and then he will be taken out into the country to see the things that make it famous.

The Board of Trade has gotten together a committee of newspapermen to entertain the visitor. They are as follows: J. W. Spear, chairman; Charles A. Stauffer, Ira H. S. Huggett, H. R. Tittle, A. G. Dolmage, Chapin Hall and C. H. Fitch. Mr. Drier will speak before the directors of the Board of Trade at a special session this evening.

GETS MORE THAN 300 RESPONSES

Four Meetings Held Yesterday and Great Response Obtained by Work of Evangelists Brown and Curry

As a result of the efforts of Rev. John E. Brown and Prof. Curry, the evangelists who in connection with the pastors are conducting a union meeting in this city at this time, over three hundred people of Phoenix yesterday accepted the propositions that were made to them by Mr. Brown and signified their intention of treading the straight and narrow way hereafter. Four services were held during the day at which invitations calculated to have a bearing upon the decisions of the audience were given, the first of these being at the Sunday School of the First Methodist church. At this meeting one hundred and twenty of the members of the Sunday School made the decision.

This service was followed by a preaching service at the First Baptist Church, where a large number responded to the invitation of the evangelist. At the afternoon meeting for men only, which was attended by fully fifteen hundred, one hundred and thirty-two responded to the invitation while at the night meeting sixty more were added to the already great total. The afternoon meeting especially was interesting to those who attended. A great male chorus was organized for the musical portion of the service and did yemen service during the afternoon.

The text taken by Mr. Brown was, "Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man sows that shall he also reap" and using this as a basis he proceeded to hand the double standard of living, the social sins of the race, gambling, drinking, swearing, and the like. A most powerful speech was delivered that had a great effect.

The subject of the night discourse was "Thou art weighed in the balance and found wanting," and the theme, "Judgment."

Substantive denunciation, especially the practice of using it as a holiday. The evangelist denounced this as the worst desecration that can possibly be. Profanity came in for a number of hot shots at night as well as the afternoon. "Profanity is cowardly, it is a violation of law and of common decency."

Today's work will be devoted to working hard for an immense Monday night crowd. "No Monday slump" is the slogan. While it is not expected to get as many as were there last night, nearly 2000, a record meeting, yet it is expected to get out a monster audience. On Tuesday the morning sessions will start again and the subject of the morning discourse at 10 o'clock will be "The Ideal Home."

BULLARD AND SMILE BACK FROM CAPITAL

Attorney General Returns Home After Month's Absence.

With the smile on his face that has made him known all over the west, Attorney General George Purdy Bullard alighted from the train yesterday in Phoenix from Washington, after an absence of more than a month, in which time he has been actually from coast to coast. Bullard was the referee of the great Vanderbilt cup automobile race at Santa Monica in February, leaving almost immediately afterwards for Washington to appear before the United States supreme court in the tax suit against the Copper Queen Company, for back taxes of several years standing.

The story is told in connection with the argument in the case that the Arizona Attorney General caused another precedent to be broken in the august court, when he told his story in such a way as to make the court burst out laughing. Anyway the Attorney received the congratulations of many prominent members of the bar and of the court for the argument in the case. Elias S. Clark of Prescott, who was Attorney General when the case was originally brought, also presented the case for the state before the court.

FUNERAL OF FRANK BURGESS—The funeral of Frank Burgess, the journeyman painter, who died on Saturday after a short illness, will be held from the parlors of Moore & McLehlan this afternoon at 2:30. The funeral will be under the direction of the Knights of Pythias, of which the deceased was an honored member. A large representation of the local lodge has announced its intention to attend the ceremonies. Interment will be made in the Pythian cemetery.


