ARIZONA AUTO ASSOCIATION IS ORGANIZED

E. P. Conway of This City is President—Affiliation With A. A. A. Will Be First Duty of New Association

There no longer exists any question as to whether Arizona has a state automobile association. Whether or not it had one in the past was a mooted question for the Maricopa County Auto club was the only one in the old organization that said any due to the A. A. A. as is required for the perfection of such an association.

Directly following the automobile races yesterday, a meeting was held to organize a state automobile association, four clubs being represented by delegates, the Maricopa Auto club, Warren District Auto club, Apache County Auto club and Prescott Auto club. At this meeting a constitution and by-laws were adopted, as provided by the A. A. A. requirements to affiliate therewith, officers were elected and the organization perfected except for the appointment of the executive committee, one member of which will be named by each club in the organization. In addition to these four clubs, Yuma county has signified its desire to enter into the membership and Tucson and Globe are expected to follow. The officers are E. P. Conway, president; T. G. Norris and Fred Coulter, vice presidents and Joseph H. Gray, secretary and treasurer.

Within a week each of the auto clubs that were represented at yesterday's meeting and the Yuma county club will

receive a request to furnish the secretary of the state association with a list of all of its members in good standing and a remittance of \$1 for each member. Half of this will go to the A. A. A. and the remainder to the state association. The clubs that desire the official emblem for the cars of its members will then be entitled to obtain the same. The state association will be auxiliary to the national, it being the desire of that body to obtain larger units rather than individual clubs.

Following advice as to appointment of directors, the payment into the treasury of the dues and a ratification from the national association President Conway will call a meeting of the executive committee in which the other committees will be determined and their members named and the real work brought under way.
