VERDICT FOR \$17,000 AGAINST CONTRACTORS

James Hanson, a Carpenter, Wins Damage Suit for Personal Injuries

A verdict in favor of James Hanson for \$17,000 was rendered in the superior court yesterday afternoon against the Concrete Construction company, for damages for personal injuries sustained by Hanson, who was a carpenter upon the Pratt-Gilbert building, and who stepped upon a "jack board" and fell through the scaffolding ten feet to the ground, some few months ago.

The suit was peculiar in many respects, especially as the jointers of parties at interest, Hanson through his attorneys, Mouser and Brumbeck, sued Pratt Gilbert and company as a corporation, and the two men as individuals, as well as the concrete construction company, the contractors, for forty thousand dollars.

The suit has been before the superior court for all of a week, and was not decided until yesterday. The jury exonerated Pratt and Gilbert from any responsibility, and brought in its verdict against the concrete company only. H. M. Pennington represented Pratt Gilbert and L. T. Hardy the contractors. It is understood the case will be appealed.

MILITIA IS HEADED TOWARD ENCAMPMENT

Coming Tour of Instruction to be Best Ever Held in Arizona

With the arrival in Phoenix this evening of Companies F and I from the northern part of the state, the first detachment of the Arizona National Guard may be considered as under way for the annual camp at Fort Huachuca. Here they will be joined by approximately 250 men from Maricopa county alone and headed by the First Regiment band will board the military special leaving over the Southern Pacific tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Company F of Snowflake left last night, trekking a thirty miles to Holbrook, where they will board the train early this morning. At Flagstaff they will be joined by Company I, and at Prescott by one platoon of the machine gun company. They will arrive over the Santa Fe tonight at 9:55.

The special which leaves here tomorrow morning will consist of five coaches and two baggage cars. It will be boarded at Tempe by Companies C and D of Tempe and Mesa, and at Maricopa the sleepers carrying Companies H and L of Yuma will be attached. The train will reach Fort Huachuca about midnight Wednesday night.
