### SOLD LIQUOR WITHOUT LICENSE. NOW IN JAIL

Eufanio Flores Draws 50-50 Sentence from Justice

Judge George S. Irwin yesterday morning fined Eufanio Flores fifty dollars for selling liquor without a license. Flores was brought into court Monday by Deputy George Brawner, who arrested him Sunday at his place in a Yaqui settlement west of Chandler. Flores did not know how to plead exactly, but when two Mexicans said that they had bought booze from him, he thought that maybe they did. So upon those facts Judge Irwin thought best to fine him an appropriate sum. Being unable to pay the fine Flores was committed to jail and was carried over to the county jail at Phoenix by Deputy George Brawner.

For some time it had been suspected that Flores was doing a land office booze business selling "fire water" to the Yaqui residents of his settlement. Saturday night there was quite a debauch and revelry around and in his place and the authorities commenced an investigation which resulted in his arrest on the charge. Two Mexicans that had formed a grievance against Flores, admitted the truth of the charge of buying the stuff from Eufanio and he did not try to enter a denial. He will repeat his misdeeds in the county hostrery.

### NICOLL'S CASE CONTINUED

The hearing in the case of R. W. Nicoll, who is charged with peddling without a license, was continued yesterday morning, when City Attorney Dougherty was called to Florence on business. Nicoll intends to fight the case right on through the supreme court, if necessary, as he feels that the city ordinance was an unjust discrimination against him.

### CHARGED WITH JOSHING THE PLAYERS

Marshal Peyton has sworn out a warrant charging J. C. Entz, who works at Stapley's with raising a disturbance at the ball game Saturday. It seems that Entz, who was on the outside, joshed the Miami players and they complained to the marshal.

### COMMERCIAL CLUB PREMIUM

Secretary Irwin has mailed to Mrs. J. R. Whitton of 19 South First avenue, Phoenix, a check for five dollars, that being the prize offered for the best three cantaloupes exhibited at the fair, but Mrs. Whitton's were judged to be the finest of the lot.

### NUMBERING HOUSES

The houses of Mesa are undergoing a coat of numbering. Heretofore the houses have been without any identification other than the names of the owners, or occupants, and none has had said name painted on the out-

side. Hence it has not always been an easy matter to tell just what the house claimed for itself—the personality of the owner and the individual characteristics of its inhabitants. This is no more to be. Numbers, bright and shining, will be placed on the front of all Mesa residences and business houses and hereafter it will be a case of four, eleven or forty-four and every house will be identified.

The city ordinance requiring the numbering of houses was passed some five weeks or more ago and thirty days given in which to do the numbering. A penalty of five dollars per day for failure to number the house by the 15th of August was attached to the ordinance giving it sanction and efficacy. There is some trouble being experienced in deciding just what number one's house should be, but it is expected that the trouble will be obviated and everybody will awake Wednesday morning with full knowledge of his number.
