BY THE KING George R. I. A Proclamation. WHEREAS a state of war exists between us on the one hand and the German Empire on the other:

And whereas it constitutes adherence to our enemies for any of our subjects or persons resident or being in our dominions during the continuance of the state of war to contribute to or participate in or assist in the floating of any loan by the German Government, or to advance money to or enter into any contract or dealings whatsoever with the said Government (save upon our command), or otherwise to aid, abet, or assist the said Government:

Now, therefore, We do hereby warn all our subjects and all persons resident or being in our dominions who may be found doing or attempting any of such treasonable acts as aforesaid that they will be liable to be apprehended and dealt with as traitors, and will be proceeded against with the utmost rigour of the law.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace this fifth day of August, in the year of Our Lord nineteen hundred and fourteen, and in the fifth year of Our reign.
