Every real estate office in Phoenix will have a delegation at Riverside park on Wednesday afternoon and a number of the offices will close in order to let the entire force go down to enjoy Real Estate Day by "The Phoenix Ocean."

Possibly the big park down by the river means more to the real estate men than to any other branch of business; at any rate they seem to think so and have accepted the invitation of the management to attend in force tomorrow and enjoy the hospitality offered them.

It will be a get-together day for the most boosters of all Phoenix boosters. SOME OPPOSITION TO NEW NOGALES PLANT

Corporation Commission Hears Application of International Gas Company Pro and Con

Hearing of the application of the International Gas company of Nogales for permission to issue \$200,000 worth of bonds for the construction of a new electric light plant and ice factory at that point occupied most of the day yesterday for the corporation commission.

Barry and Barry of Nogales appeared before the commission on behalf of the Nogales Light, Ice and Water company, which is vigorously opposing the granting of the application. Objection was taken on the ground that there is now one public utility company in the field, and that it is supplying the demand.

On the other hand, the applicants, through their lawyers, Armstrong and Lewis, contend that the present service is inadequate and that the new company will be equipped to supply the demand in a way which is not being done at present.

Judge Frank J. Duffy of Nogales, formerly judge of the superior court of Santa Cruz county represented the city of Nogales at the hearing. Spiro S. Proto of Nogales, president of the company, Engineer Davidson of New York and a number of witnesses appeared for the company.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE PHOENIX HARDWARE COMPANY

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, J. B. Long and J. W. Long, of Maricopa County, Arizona, desiring to incorporate ourselves and become incorporated under the provisions of the laws of the Territory of Arizona, for the purpose of engaging in the lawful enterprises, business and occupation hereinafter specified, do make adopt, sign and acknowledge according to law these Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I. The names of the incorporators are J. B. Long and J. W. Long. The name adopted by this corporation and by which it shall be known in all of its affairs is the "PHOENIX HARDWARE CO." and its principal place of transacting business is and shall be the City of Phoenix, in the County and Territory aforesaid, but it shall have the right to transact its business in such other place or places in said Territory as the Board of Directors may hereafter from time to time designate.

ARTICLE II. The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by this

VALLEY LETTUCE BY TRAIN-LOAD

Arizona Vegetable Growers Announce That 300 Cars Will Be Shipped to Eastern Markets Next Season—Will Organize.

The Salt River Valley will send 300 carloads of lettuce to eastern markets next winter. This announcement was made at the first meeting of the Arizona Vegetable Growers' association final steps in the organization of which were taken yesterday.

Approximately 300 acres have already been signed up by Phoenix, Glendale and Chandler growers for the production of New York head lettuce for the early eastern markets, and it is to handle this crop, as well as other vegetables that the new organization has been formed. For the coming season, it is probable that only lettuce will be handled, although there is a possibility that peas from the Salt River valley may be introduced to eastern markets early next spring. Plans for the future include the promotion and encouragement of "Arizona" asparagus, peas and fancy lettuce, large quantities of which will be shipped from here long before the snow has begun to melt in the eastern part of the country.

Interest in lettuce growing has been steadily growing since last season, when three cars were shipped from the valley, and with a one-hundred per cent increase over last year's average already assured, prospects for the early development of a large annual yield are considered excellent. A cogent argument for the growing of the crisp vegetable that has undoubtedly caused many growers to sign up their land with the association, is the experience of J. S. Heard, who last year cleared \$300 an acre from three acres.

Three members from each of the local associations at Phoenix, Glendale and Chandler comprise the central association with headquarters in this city. The officers and members of the central organization are: President, W. B. Tamm, Glendale; secretary, F. C. McNamara, Phoenix; treasurer, J. W. Lewis, Chandler. Members: John Schollos, W. O. Ferris, Glendale; C. H. Brown, J. W. Parkhurst, Chandler; J. S. Heard, R. Lowe, Phoenix. It is the intention of the association to enlist the cooperation and interest of all growers in the valley, any of whom are considered eligible to membership.

The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of three stockholders who shall be elected annually by the stockholders from among their number at the annual election thereof to be held in the office of the Company at Phoenix, Arizona, on the first Tuesday in November in each year hereafter at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M.; and until the first annual meeting of said stockholders, the following named persons who are subscribers to the capital stock of this corporation shall constitute the Board of Directors, namely: J. B. Long, J. W. Long and M. West.

ARTICLE VI. The officers of this Corporation shall be a President, Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as may be provided for by the by-laws. The President shall be elected by the Board of Directors from among their number annually immediately after the annual meeting of the stockholders.
