# OPEN FORUM FOR DEBATING STATE WIDE PROHIBITION

The very important issue of state-wide prohibition has been raised. A campaign in favor of a constitutional amendment will be shortly instituted. This, like all other, important questions has two sides, on each of which are found honest and intelligent persons.

The Republican has decided to provide for a reasonable discussion of this issue in its pages, allowing to each side at least a half column daily for signed articles, for which there will be no charge. No anonymous articles will be published.

It is only stipulated that the communications for and against prohibition be just and fair and that in no case shall there be any wild and extravagant statement that will in any way reflect upon the reputation of Phoenix for good order.

It is suggested by The Republican that either side, desiring to avail itself of this offer of space, name a committee through which all matter relating to the issue shall be transmitted. In such case, all communications received at this office from other sources will be rejected. We believe that this arrangement is necessary to keep the discussion within reasonable lines.

No paid advertisements from either side will be accepted.

**DRY AMENDMENT EXPLAINED**  
The first sentence of the dry amendment is as follows: "Ardent spirits, ale, beer, wine, or intoxicating liquor or liquors of whatever kind shall not be manufactured in or introduced into the state of Arizona under any pretense."

Not one of these terms has anything whatever to do with hair tonics, cosmetics, face washes or anything else of like character because they refer simply and solely to beverage liquors. They do not include medicines of any kind because no medicines bear any legal definition that will come under the above terms, and no court is going to construe any of these terms to include medicine of any kind.

Under this amendment Peruna, Hostetter's Bitters, Wine of Cardui, or any other of these preparations containing alcohol in varying quantities can be sold the same as now. While some people use them as beverages they are not legally defined as such, and cannot be embraced in the terms of the amendment.

The federal constitution, which gives to congress sole power to regulate interstate commerce, prevents the enforcement of just one feature of the above law and that is contained in the words, "Introduced into the state of Arizona under any pretense."

Late decisions of the courts give interstate carriers the privilege of delivering all kinds of liquors in dry territory, and the state law cannot interfere to prevent such delivery. But, when delivered, the liquors become subject to the state law, and if used for illegal purpose can be seized and destroyed, but if used for a legal purpose the state law cannot interfere.

As this amendment does not make it illegal to drink liquor nor illegal to manufacture medicines, tinctures, essences, chemicals or pharmaceuticals, the natural conclusion is that anyone can import all the liquor he wishes so long as he uses it for legal purposes, which, of course, include medicinal, mechanical, culinary, art and sacramental purposes.

It is idle for the liquor forces to attempt to read into this language a meaning that is not there and mislead the people by falsifying the facts.

The second sentence in the amendment is as follows: "Every person who sells, exchanges, gives, barter, or disposes of any ardent spirits, ale, beer, wine or intoxicating liquor of any kind, to any person in the state of Arizona, or who manufactures, or introduces into, or attempts to introduce into the state of Arizona any ardent spirits, ale, beer,
