TEMPE MILITIAMEN ASPIRE TO WIN HONORS

Captain Irish Putting New Life Into Organization—Plans for Taking Crack Company to Camp

In order that Company C may be fully prepared for the approaching inspection, Captain F. M. Irish has requested that every member be present at 8 o'clock this evening for the regular weekly drill. The company is still in need of recruits to bring the quota of men up to the standard and the officers are endeavoring to get all the live young men of Tempe enrolled.

Members of the Tempe military company not only have the advantage of the military training, but also have the benefits attendant upon affiliation with a civic club. The weekly meetings cannot fail to have a beneficial effect upon both the members and the town as well.

"Military service is a patriotic duty which every American owes to his country," so reads the motto of the National Guard of Arizona. Certainly he, who in time of peace sacrifices a little time to prepare himself for the country's defense, is springing his country just as truly as he who in the enthusiasm of a national crisis enlists for service in the field.

A systematic course of instruction is being prepared which cannot fail to inculcate the patriotic young or old, and now is the time to join, while the course is in its elementary stages. A special order from the office of the adjutant general has assigned to duty with Company C, First Lieutenant A. J. Mullen, long identified with the National Guard and the winner of many trophies in the national rifle matches at Camp Perry. Lieut. ORDINANCE NO. 32 (Continued From Page Six)
Each additional three sockets or less, .65
For each motor or generator of 1 h. p. or less, .50
For each motor or generator of more than 1 h. p. and not more than 5 h. p., 1.00
For each motor or generator of more than 5 h. p. and not more than 10 h. p., 1.25
For each motor or generator of more than 10 h. p. and not more than 15 h. p., 1.50
For each motor or generator of more than 15 h. p. and not more than 20 h. p., 2.00
For each additional 10 h. p. over 20 h. p., .25
For each regulator, 1.25
Other current or voltage regulating devices, each, .25

All devices consuming an excess of 600 watts will take the same fee as motors of the same wattage or current consumption. Provided however, that the minimum amount of any bill of fees to be charged shall not be less than 75c for any job where the cost of labor and material exceeds \$2.00 and not less than 25c where the cost of labor and material is less than \$2.00.

Each such corporation, partnership, association or individual, or agent thereof, before commencing the placing or installing of any electrical wires, appliances, apparatus, construction or other structure within the City of Phoenix and at or prior to the time of securing a permit for the placing or installing thereof, shall deposit with the City Inspector of Buildings such sum of money as the said City Inspector of Buildings shall estimate as sufficient to cover the total amount of fees to become due to the City hereunder for such contemplated work. However, in no event shall such sum so to be deposited be less than the sum of Two Dollars. And upon completion of such placing and installing, and after inspection and passing thereof by the City Inspector of Buildings, the fees due to the City under section 2 hereof shall be deducted from such sum of money, and the remainder, if any, shall be returned to the corporation, partnership, association or individual so depositing the same, together with the certificate of inspection of said placing or installation.

The duties hereby required to be performed by the City Inspector of Buildings may be performed by the said City Inspector of Buildings, or by assistants authorized thereto by the City Commission by ordinance or resolution.

Sec. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, and only to the extent that they are in conflict herewith, and hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. Whereas, the immediate operation of this ordinance is necessary for the public peace, health and safety of the City, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance is hereby exempted from the referendum clause of the State Constitution and the City Charter, and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission of the City of Phoenix and approval by the Mayor, and shall be published as required by the City Charter.

MESA CITY COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MEET

Heard Number of Claims Relative to the Quarterly License Law—Street Signs Being Put Up

The regular meeting of the city council was held in the town hall Tuesday evening with a full attendance of members. The claims against the city were allowed. On account of the added duties of the city clerk and treasurer as well as the collector of the water board and tax collector and adding machine was purchased at a cost of \$275.00. The machine has been used for the past several months on trial and it was the opinion of the clerk who have been using it that it has come to be indispensable.

A number of the restaurant owners, protesting against the hamburger stand which has been in operation on the Grover corner for some time. The stand was laid over and the hamburger stand will be allowed to operate in the meantime.

On petition from a number of the residents of Robson street between First avenue and First street to the effect that the fire water pressure was insufficient, it was decided by the water board to install a main four inches in diameter along Robson street which will furnish adequate fire protection.

The Elkes Stage line appeared through representatives to get their license lowered. They claimed that the charge of \$5.00 per car per quarter was too much. However, the amount was not lowered.

The street supervisor reported on the putting up of the posts which are to support the street signs. The street signs are to have a blue black ground with white lettering and will soon be put in place.

The owners of pool halls appeared and asked that their quarterly license be lowered to that of the soda fountain. The matter was referred to the city attorney.

Samuel Burrows appeared and asked that the license for holding an auction be changed from \$15 per day to \$2.50 per day.

The matter of the Commercial Club using the city hall for a meeting place and as an exhibit room was brought up and it was decided that the council room was already crowded and that it should not be used for an exhibit room. The privilege of holding meetings was granted in that the council room has always been open for such meetings.

ORDINANCE NO. 31
AN ORDINANCE TO PROMOTE ECONOMY IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX, as follows:
Sec. 1. That the City Manager is authorized and empowered, whenever and so long as in his judgment the best interests of the City and of the citizens thereof will be subserved or promoted thereby, to consolidate any of the offices, assistantships and employments created and provided for, or which may be hereafter created and provided for, by any ordinance of the City of Phoenix, with any other office, assistantship or employment which is or may be created and provided for by city ordinance, or which is created and provided for by the terms of the City Charter of the City of Phoenix; and he is hereby authorized and empowered to direct and require that such offices, assistantships or employments so consolidated shall be filled by one and the same person, and that the duties and services pertaining to or pertaining to such offices, assistantships or employments shall be performed and rendered by one and the same person.

Sec. 2. Whenever any offices, assistantships or employments are or may be consolidated with any other office, assistantship or employment hereunder, the person appointed to fill the said consolidated offices, assistantships or employments, before entering upon the performance of the duties thereof, shall make and file his official bond, conditioned as required by law, in an amount to be fixed by the City Manager and at least equal to the largest bond required by law for either one of said offices, assistantships or employments so consolidated; and the compensation to be paid to the incumbent thereof shall be the salary or compensation provided by law for the highest salaried of the offices, assistantships or employments so consolidated, until the Commission of the City of Phoenix shall by ordinance or resolution otherwise provide.

Sec. 3. Whereas, this ordinance requires early operation in order to preserve the public peace, health and safety, and in order to more economically and efficiently conduct and administer the government and affairs of the City, the Commission of the City of Phoenix, and he is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission of the City of Phoenix and approved by the Mayor, and is hereby exempted from the operation of the referendum provisions of the City Charter.

ORDINANCE NO. 33
WHEREAS, on the 6th day of July, 1914, an ordinance was passed by this Commission and approved by the Mayor, being Ordinance No. 18, by which ordinance the grades of the center line of roadway on First Street from the north line of Adams Street to the south line of Roosevelt Street in Churchill Addition to the City of Phoenix was established;

WHEREAS, it is desired that in the event First Street from the north line of Adams Street to the south line of Roosevelt Street in Churchill Addition to the City of Phoenix be hereafter paved, that the grade as set forth in said ordinance No. 18 shall be the grade to which paving shall be laid.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX, AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. That in the event First Street from the north line of Adams Street to the south line of Roosevelt Street in Churchill Addition to the City of Phoenix, is hereafter ordered to be paved, that the grade for said streets be 64 feet and established in said ordinance No. 18 shall be the grade to which said paving shall be laid.

Section 2. All rails of any street car line laid on said street shall be elevated a maximum elevation of one-quarter (1/4) inch above the pavement immediately adjacent thereto.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall not apply to the grade on said street between the south line of Van Buren and the north line of Polk street.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty days after its passage and approval by the Mayor, and publications as required by the charter of the City of Phoenix.
