WORKING TELLS OF COOPERATION

Farm Advisor is Like Man Who Knows Everybody's Troubles and How to Remedy Them — Study Precedes Effort

"One man, who will go among the farmers with a question in his mouth instead of good advice, all the time, will prove more valuable to them than they know," was the surprising statement of D. W. Working, lecturer with the University agricultural bureau from the Washington department. Mr. Working was addressing a meeting of farmers and business men at the Water temple on the subject of the farm advisor.

"In every community there is need of co-operation in study and co-operation in work. Study should come first, and then the work will be more efficient and better directed.

"You know that a man might come to this valley and grab along for a while and, if he were persistent, he might learn in time to make a living off an irrigated farm. You also know that in some places there are men who just naturally learn all about everybody's farms so that he is able to answer questions about them all. Well, it is just that sort of man—only trained by many years of study and experiment, to learn more quickly and thoroughly the defects in farms—who will be your farm advisor. He is a man to whom all farmers may carry their troubles. He tells everybody else everybody's troubles, and they all learn from them. In this way the farmer helps himself and helps his neighbor. And this is the best sort of co-operation, after all."

Mr. Working illustrated his lecture with stereopticon views, showing the work of the farm advisor and the results obtained.

The Arizona Corporation Commission does hereby certify that the annexed is a true and complete transcript of the Articles of Incorporation of the Central Bank of Phoenix, which were filed in the office of said Arizona Corporation Commission on the 4th day of January, A. D. 1915, at 10:20 o'clock, A. M., as provided by law.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Arizona; and we do hereby certify:

I.

That the names, residences and post office addresses of the undersigned incorporators are as follows:

II.

That the name of this corporation is The Central Bank of Phoenix, and its principal place of transacting business shall be at Phoenix, Maricopa County, State of Arizona.

III.

The general nature of the business

proposed to be transacted by the corporation shall be that of banking; and to that end it shall have the power to receive, as banker, as depositors or otherwise, checks, drafts, bills of exchange, currency, specie or other forms of money or means of payment thereof, and to hold the same or collect and hold the same; to pay out monies or credits upon checks or drafts signed by its depositors, or otherwise, to provide by its By-laws or by contract or otherwise, whether interest shall be paid upon any funds deposited with it and upon what conditions and upon what terms, if any, any funds deposited with it shall draw interest; to make, sign, execute and deliver, or issue, or cause to be made, signed, executed and delivered, or issued, any and all kinds of checks, drafts or bills of exchange against any funds belonging to it or its depositors or otherwise; to deposit its funds or to redeposit its deposits, funds in or with any other bank or banks, any banker or bankers, trust company or companies, whether charging interest or not, or otherwise; to loan money upon stocks, bonds, real estate or chattel mortgages, or other securities, and upon notes, bonds or other evidences of indebtedness; to sell hypothecate or pledge notes, bills of exchange, or other evidences of indebtedness owned, used or held by it; to construct, purchase, hire, lease or otherwise acquire safe deposit vaults, and operate the same by sub-letting space therein or otherwise, and generally to make any and all contracts and to do and perform, all and sundry the acts and things necessary and proper to be done and performed in the carrying out of any of the purposes hereinbefore set forth; and also to do and perform all and sundry the acts and things, whether or not they be herein specifically enumerated, that may pertain to the general business of banking, to purchase, or otherwise acquire, hire, own, use, pledge, mortgage, operate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate and of any personal property of any kind or character as it may consider necessary in the conduct of its said business to the extent that may

be permissible under the laws of Arizona.

IV.

That the amount of the capital stock of this corporation which is authorized is the sum of one Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), divided into One Thousand (1000) shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each; and that of this amount the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) Dollars is to be subscribed at the date hereof and is to be paid for in cash at the 1st day of January, 1915, or before this corporation shall apply for a license to engage in the business for which it is organized; the amount of the capital stock not thus subscribed and paid for shall remain unissued until such time or times as the corporation shall direct, through a regular meeting of the stockholders, or a special meeting called for that purpose, provided, such authorization shall receive the vote of the majority of stock as shown by the records of the corporation.

V.

That the time at the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of its articles of incorporation in the office of the Corporation Commission of the State, and the time of its termination or expiration shall be Twenty-five (25) years thereafter.

VI.

That the affairs of this corporation are to be conducted by a Board of Directors of not less than Five (5) or more than Nine (9) members, each of whom shall be a stockholder of the corporation. The above named incorporators shall constitute the Board of Directors until the first annual meeting of the Stockholders as hereinafter provided for, and until otherwise ordered by the Stockholders or by the Board of Directors, as hereinafter provided, the number of directors shall be Five (5). The stockholders at any annual meeting thereof, or the Board of Directors by resolution at any meeting thereof called for that purpose, may increase the number of Directors from Five (5) to any number not exceeding Nine (9), and elect such additional members. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining Directors. Each member of the Board shall hold office from the time of his election and qualification until the next annual meeting of the Stockholders and until his successor is elected and qualified, except he be removed for cause as hereinafter provided. The annual meeting of the Stockholders shall be held as the By-Laws may direct on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January of each year; The Board of Directors shall annually elect a President and one or more Vice-Presidents of the corporation from their number, and a Cashier who may or may not be a Director of the corporation. The Board of Directors may provide for other officers who may or may not be stockholders of the company as the Board of Directors may determine. The duties of the officers shall be such as usually appertain to such offices subject to such limitations as may be provided for in the By-Laws of the corporation.

By-Laws for the government of the corporation may be adopted at any annual meeting of the Stockholders or at any special meeting called for the purpose, or may be adopted by the Board of Directors, and likewise may be repealed or amended. Any officer or director may be removed from office by the Stockholders at any special meeting thereof called for that purpose, and his successor elected at such meeting. Any vacancy occurring in any office of the corporation shall be filled by the Board of Directors. At all meetings of the Stockholders a majority of the outstanding stock shall constitute a quorum and each stockholder shall have one vote for each share of stock standing in his name upon the books of the company.

VII.

That the highest amount of in-

debtedness or liability direct or contingent, except such as may be created by the receiving of deposits and the issue of certificates of deposits, checks, and bills of exchange, or by re-discounting its paper, or which may otherwise be created in the transaction of its business of banking as hereinbefore set forth, to which the corporation is at any time to subject itself be two-thirds of the amount of its outstanding capital stock.

VIII.

Except as provided by existing law in the case of a banking corporation, the private property of the Stockholders of this corporation is to be exempt from corporate debts.
