

CHILTON ARRIVES—Traveling Passenger Agent J. H. Chilton of the Texas and Pacific railroad, with headquarters in El Paso arrived in Phoenix yesterday and renewed his acquaintance with local railroad men, and others with whom his work ordinarily brings him in contact. He expressed himself as well pleased with general conditions and stated that the Texas and Pacific railroad had ordered him to pay more attention in the future because of its growing importance.

SULLIVAN IN TOWN—When the average person sees the letters "F. R. S." he generally interprets them to mean "Fellow of the Royal Society," but these initials appearing upon the Hotel Adams register yesterday, indicated that F. R. BUSINESS MEN ORGANIZE

The executive committee appointed consists of John H. Robinson, Yavapai; George Fusch, Pima; C. O. Ellis, Cochise; F. F. Towle, Gila, these four are to choose a fifth member if it is deemed advisable.
Today's belief proved conclusively that the opposition that has arisen to the drastic prohibitory amendment adopted at the recent election has emanated from the bankers, merchants and other business and professional men outside those who were formerly engaged in the liquor traffic. It was a notable fact that the most prominent men in the business world in Arizona appeared voluntarily and at their own expense as delegates to the meeting in order to express their disapproval of the conditions that have been brought about by the "dry law," while not one man even remotely connected with the retail or wholesale liquor trade was present at the session.

An idea of the character of the meeting may be obtained from the following list of some of the men who attended as delegates: A. G. Hulett, A. P. Cropper, J. F. McElroy, L. F. Verkamp, J. S. Miles, Harry Brisley, William Ryan, and Harold Steinfield, merchants; Richard Lamson, Norman J. Johnson and C. J. Herndon, attorneys; J. W. Milnes and C. E. Hogue, editors; H. D. Atken, president Yavapai county chamber of commerce; Albert Jones, W. F. Jurcell, John Duke, W. G. Shanley, stockmen; F. J. Hart, physician; Joe Prochaska and Pat Rose, capitalists; C. E. Gentry, assessor of Yavapai, and Tom Campbell, state tax commissioner.

Petitions will be prepared at once and placed in the hands of the various county representatives. Upon obtaining signatures amounting to fifteen per cent of the number cast for all candidates for governor at the last election the petitions will be presented to the legislature. Under the constitution the legislators are empowered to call a special election if they believe an emergency exists and with the weight of many of the most prominent business men in the state behind a demand for a reconsideration of these measures, it is believed that there will be no delay in obtaining the favorable action of the legislature.

L. F. Sweeting, assistant chief clerk; P. J. Munch; chaplain, Rev. Seaborn Crutchfield; W. B. Lanier, reading clerk; M. J. Sullivan, enrolling and engraving clerk; R. B. Leach, sergeant at arms, George Patton; doorkeeper; Kelly Moer, page; clerks Mary Barton, Amy Greenleaf, Estelle Griffin, Nell C. Short, Alice Peterson, Mrs. M. G. Burns, Mrs. I. M. Chairman Jones of the committee said that the list was not yet quite complete but that the committee was engaged in making a study of the qualifications of applicants. The pay of the chief clerk was fixed at \$4 a day and that of the other attaches at \$5 a day. In the senate,

the pay of the secretary is \$7 a day and that of the assistant \$6 a day.

After the attaches had been sworn in Speaker Brooks informed them that they would be expected to attend to their duties and that under the rules of the legislature they could not engage in lobbying and there would be no pay for over time. He intimated that it was not wholly undeserved for he had been a Kentucky, a Texan, an Arizonian and always a Methodist preacher and a democratic politician and if nothing good could come out of that there could no good come out of Nazareth.

There had been some misunderstanding regarding the appointment of Williams a janitor. When his name was presented as an appointee from Maricopa county, Representative Vaughn raised an objection or rather a question. It appeared that the appointment had been suggested by Mohave county and Representative Mahoney of that county said that Mohave would adopt Williams but he said "The job is an insignificant one and I do not see why Maricopa does not want to take credit for it." Maricopa, by the way, does not get much out of the wash and those who were watching the trend of events did not expect that it would. Maricopa has had rather more than its share in the past.

The clerks, however, are a fine-looking lot and accommodating, and in the opinion of observers, entirely competent.

The Press
The newspaper reporters ever since they were shoved into the upper reaches at the time of the constitutional convention, where they could see and not hear, have been clamoring for closer fellowship with the members. Both the speaker and the president have inclined their ears unto them and yesterday afternoon President Sims suggested to the rules committee that an arrangement ought to be made for bringing the reporters down to the floor on the condition that the number of them be placed within reasonable limits and that they be put under bonds not to contaminate the members or interrupt the proceedings of the legislature by unseemly conduct. This proposal seemed to meet with general approval. Uncle George Chasner of Greenlee took occasion to remark that he had tried to modify the work of the reporters at the last session by changing the press gallery and he would now favor any suggestion for the further amelioration of their condition. He had previously been rewarded, he said, for his efforts in their behalf by their expressions of gratitude.
"They gave you complimentary write-ups," suggested a new member. "They did not," replied Uncle George, "because they knew I did not want them. Printer's ink is a powerful medicine; a drop of it is powerful enough to revolutionize the world and a teaspoonful of it will kill the finest pup you ever saw."
After this tribute to the potency of the fourth estate the senate adjourned until half past nine o'clock this morning. The house had previously adjourned to ten o'clock.
