**FINANCES AND MARKETS**

 NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The stock market recovered considerably from the inertia of the early part of the week. Dealings were larger and the shares made little progress and were under pressure throughout. Most prominent international, particularly transcontinentals, metal stocks and steel reflected this, Canadian Pacific being a notable exception. Important gains were confined chiefly to special class stocks, some showing evidence of pool manipulations. Forecasts of another large cash gain by local banks brought a reduction of sixty and ninety day loans to 3 1/2 per cent, and all longer loans on a 2 1/2 per cent basis. Another advance in wheat options to the highest in some years emphasized the immense shipments of food-stuffs the current week. Indications suggest another huge excess of ex-
