TEMPE COUNCIL ESTIMATES 1915 PUBLIC EXPENSES A Decrease of One Thousand Dollars in Tax Levy is Interesting Point to Property Owners

Eighteen thousand, seven hundred and eighty six dollars are wanted to do down the town of Tempe the ensuing fiscal year, commencing September first, 1914, and ending August 31st, 1915, according to the annual budget which was recently compiled by the council at a special meeting of this amount \$8,567.00, will be raised by direct taxation on real and personal property within Tempe.

The council in compiling the 1915 budget estimated the different amounts required to meet the public expenses on improvements, for the maintenance of public buildings, structures and institutions, the salary of each public officer and employee, the maintenance of public streets, highways and bridges, and the construction, operation and maintenance of each public utility. By a comparison with expenses for the past year, allotments of funds are proposed to be made as follows for each division of the year's expenditures: General administration, \$475; streets and bridges, \$8,525.00; town hall, \$150.00; town park, \$183.99; town jail, \$75.00; fire department, \$550.00; town police, \$200.00; police department, \$175.00; health department, \$425.00; irrigation, \$900; elections, \$20.00; officers' salaries, \$1125.00; water department, \$974.00. Of the \$18,788.00 that must be raised for the operation of public institutions in Tempe, it is estimated that \$10,251.00 will be covered for by receipts from the water rentals, interest on bonds, licenses, dog taxes, sprinkling, fines and irrigation.

The decrease of a thousand dollars in the amount to be raised by taxation is no doubt a welcome factor to the taxpayers who are to contribute to the fund.

In presenting the budget to the public notice has been given that the council will meet on the evening of the 9th of next month, at which time the tax payers may be heard in favor or against any proposed tax levies as have been set forth in the estimates. It is expected that the estimates will be finally determined upon at that meeting.
