CULTURE AND AGRICULTURE

"Today you can't say, 'Send the fool of the family to the farm.' Today the successful farmer is an educated man."

Thus, Professor Stanley F. Morse, superintendent of the agricultural extension service of the University of Arizona, College of Agriculture, before a large crowd in the auditorium of the Monroe school last night, Prof. Morse was delivering his able lecture on "Culture and Agriculture" a part of the Y. M. C. A. lecture course.

It was the speaker's purpose to show the beginning of agriculture the beginning of culture, and the development of the two alongside each other down through the ages since man began to reason. Culture is co-ordinate with, and an outgrowth of agriculture, according to the speaker.

"Agriculture is a very complex and scientific subject. It is not now possible to relegate the men of lesser mental equipment to the task of tilling the soil, because it takes an educated man to be a good farmer."

"The farmer of today is not ashamed of his culture, as used to be of yore. Neither is the cultured man of today embarrassed at being a tiller of the soil."

History, which agriculture has made in other communities of this earth is being repeated right here in the Salt River valley. According to Prof. Morse, if his theories are sound, the Salt River valley will one day be one of the seats of culture of the United States.

The extension work of the University, which is one of the methods, the educators are using to bring culture to the agriculturist was touched upon by the speaker. He mentions the fact that a farm advisor would today be selected out of some half dozen applicants brought here by the university to serve the farmers of Maricopa county.

Farmers' Meeting. A call has been issued for a meeting of the farmers at the Water Users' building today to go over with Prof. Morse the applicants for the position of farm advisor. The meeting is at two o'clock.

UNIFORM RULES FOR WEIGHING FREIGHT

Uniform rules governing the weighing and re-weighing of freight which have been adopted by practically all the railroads of the company were approved by the corporation commission yesterday and will be put into effect in Arizona at once.

The rules provide for the re-weighing of freight in carload lots in case of accident to shipment in transit, on application of consignee or consignee, or in order to verify weighing on other scales. An important feature of the new rules is the tolerance clause establishing the minimum difference in weights due to variation in scales or weighing which may be permitted without correction of the billed weight. The minimum tolerance on all carload freight, including coal and coke is 500 pounds, or one per cent of the weight. On shipments of ashes, slag, gravel, ore, brick and stone, the minimum tolerance allowed is 1000 lbs.

The American Railway association adopted uniform rules governing weighing after an extensive investigation recently by the interstate commerce commission, which has approved the rules as they now stand.
