MESA MID-SUMMER SHOW OF AGRICULTURAL THINGS

Plan to be Outlined Tuesday at Meeting of the Mesa Poultry and Pet Stock Association. There is a movement on foot among the ranchers and business men for a mid summer exhibit of agricultural products of the Mesa section.

The splendid success of the chicken show held at this place during the last week in January has led to the proposal of a plan to feature an agricultural exhibit along similar lines. Nothing of this kind has ever been held in the Mesa section, that is which has been distinctly a Mesa exhibit and it is believed that it will become a very popular affair.

The matter as yet has not been placed before the Commercial Club but it is believed by the promoters that the local organization will gladly assist in it for it is distinctively within the field of the Commercial Club. It will be an incentive to the club for the reason that it will furnish a splendid display and one which will bring out the very best products that can be produced in the Mesa section.

There are a number of local enthusiasts over the agricultural resources who are ready to assist materially with the proposition and it is safe to say that it will at least be attempted.

The matter will be taken up at the conclusion of the meeting of the Mesa Pet Stock and Poultry Association on Tuesday evening at the town hall at which time the premiums for the prize exhibits of the chicken show will be given out.
