

FRANK JAMES, NOTED OUTLAW CASHES IN

EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo., Feb. 18.—Frank James, one of the last survivors of the notorious "James gang," died on his farm near here this afternoon. James, who was seventy-four, has been in ill health for several months, and was stricken with apoplexy early this morning.

He was one of the best members of the notorious robber band whose unparalleled career for a time kept the people of a dozen states in terror. James had been living the life of a quiet farmer for more than thirty years.

state, war and navy departments the details and policy being formulated by the American government were not disclosed.

An additional warning in the German note that mines will be laid by Germany in the waters surrounding Great Britain and Ireland is regarded not only as menacing ships carrying legitimate cargoes, but as likely to add further to interruptions that American commerce has suffered since the outbreak of the war. That the United States is looking for the removal of some causes to prevent a complication in the forthcoming answer from England to the American note concerning the misuse of flags, is intimated in some official quarters. It is pointed out if the categorical assurances given by Great Britain and her allies that none of their vessels will be permitted to fly the American or other neutral flags, the safety of American vessels in the war zones will be guaranteed, and German submarines will be obliged to visit and search neutral vessels for contraband before destroying them as prizes. That other neutral states, especially Holland and the Scandinavian countries, are apprehensive concerning the situation and have consulted the United States, became known today. While there is no understanding in regard to action if any neutral vessels are sunk, the Washington government made it plain it is in accord with steps already taken by other neutral powers. Copies of their notes and representations having been furnished officials here.

Further information concerning the execution of Gen. Obregon, who was shot by the Mazatlan authorities on the night of January 24, came to the department today. Gen. Obregon, who made many friends among the Americans during the occupation of Vera Cruz, was accused of surrendering the city of Tepic without cause, of using public money, and of giving aid to the enemy. He denied all the charges the report said and claimed that had only offense had been refusal to force Mazatlan currency upon the people of Tepic. Americans raised a purse to help the general and relieve his destitute widow and children.

The Carranza agency gave out a statement tonight saying a private telegram from Mexico City indicated that all is quiet there.

in Mexico, was first arrested when the Zapatas were in control of the city, and when the Carranza forces subsequently entered, a sergeant and several Carranza soldiers made the claim there had been firing from his house.

Later he was released, only to be re-arrested, the report said, chided with pistols, taken to the barracks, and made to face a firing squad. Just in time an officer rode by, and when Jenkins protested that he was the American consular agent, the officer ordered that he be taken before Obregon. While the latter released Jenkins and apologized for the conduct of his subordinate, the state department pursued the matter with a request for the punishment of the guilty ones.


