A step toward the elimination of undesirable advertising has been made by the Des Moines Capital, according to a report in "Newspaperman."

Laird Young, Jr., of the "Capital" says:

The Des Moines Capital no longer publishes any medical advertising whatsoever. We decided on this policy after eliminating large quantities of medical advertising. The Capital does not publish liquor, loan sharks, clairvoyant, bankrupt sales, doubtful financial advertising and an immense list of classifications in the classified department.

Our effort has not been to make a bluff with advertisers, but to really protect our subscribers. The Capital has refused considerable business that was being accepted by so strict a paper as the Chicago Tribune. We are operating under the belief that a newspaper to be really great and successful must have the confidence of its readers, and to secure this confidence it must not do any unworthy act or publish a dishonest or fraudulent advertisement.

We are co-operating with the Des Moines Admen's Club and with local merchants in an effort to secure an organization similar to that of Minneapolis, in the interests of truthful advertising.

You inquire of us whether the Capital has heard from its clean policy. We have received innumerable congratulations from both local and general advertisers. We are sure that our subscribers think more of the Des Moines Capital and their approval has meant better results for the advertisers that do use the paper.

We assure you and all those who may be interested in our program in Des Moines that our object is to secure the confidence of our readers, and we want to secure this confidence by meriting it. There are many medical properties that we would not advise our friends or members of our family to take, consequently we believe it unfair to advertise them in the Capital. We also feel certain that ultimately every newspaper will adopt the same ground of censorship, and we think that the battle for clean and decent advertising has just begun.
