DAM FINE PICTURES AT LEECRAFT'S LION

Pictures Taken at Great Overflow Celebration at Roosevelt Dam Will Be shown at Lion theatre Today. Splendid Views

Those who were unable to attend the celebration at the Dam Thursday and those that were there will have the opportunity of seeing it in pictures at the Lion theatre today. With characteristic enterprise, Manager Lee Craft, co-operating with Chas. Shellerhorn of Mesa secured thirty exceptionally fine views, which have been made into slides and shows one the road to Roosevelt, Fish Creek Hill, The Barbecue, Crowds on the Roadway, scenes at New Town, and close up views of the crowds at the celebration including the pictures of Louis C. Hill, Senator Stapley, Mr. Maxwell, Senator Ashurst, Mr. Chas. Akers, Congressman Carl Hayden, Senator Bacon and views of the dam from different angles, water flowing over the spillway, the reservoir, etc. The pictures are very clear and give a fine idea of what a magnificent body of water is available for the Salt River Valley. The celebration pictures will be shown in connection with the regular program at the Lion all day today and tonight. The show opening at 10:00 A. M. and running continuously all day.

FINANCES AND MARKETS

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH] NEW YORK, April 16.—Apart from the fresh ebullition of speculative hysteria, which was most conspicuous in various industrial equipment issues, today's active stock market was essentially two sided. That is buying of specialties was frequently offset by heavy selling of standard shares which yielded an early advantage though closing with general gains. Unrestrained trading the first half hour, probably without parallel in the annals of the local exchange, was confined in a great measure to shares of companies which were supposed to be in receipt of remunerative orders from European belligerents. American Locomotive rose more than eighteen points at the outset and New York broke sixteen and numerous other industrial equipment, from five to eight points. Later air brake advanced to eighteen points. Bankers reported a marked increase in demand of high grade investment issues. Refined copper rose to the new high price of 19 1/2 cents. Total sales of stocks amounted to 1,150,800 shares. Bonds developed a broader tendency and another large volume of trading. Total sales represented a par value of \$4,043,000. United States coupon 3's advanced one half per cent on call.

hereby granted the privilege and permission to lay, construct, maintain and operate, a spur or sidetrack on Harrison Street, beginning at a point seventy feet (70') east of the East line of Ninth Avenue and Eight feet (8') south of the north line of Harrison Street, and running thence due easterly along Harrison Street to the center of Fifth Avenue, as indicated by blue-print attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Section 2. That said track shall be laid on the established grade of said street and avenues, and shall be used, laid maintained and operated subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations now in force and effect or that hereafter may be ordained, prescribed or provided by the Commission of the City of Phoenix.

Section 3. That the privilege and permission hereby granted may at any time be revoked by the Commission of the City of Phoenix.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days (30) after its passage and approval by the Mayor, and prior to its becoming effective and operative shall be published as required by the charter of the City of Phoenix, and the cost of the publication of this Ordinance shall be paid by the said Atchison, Topoka and Santa Fe Railway Company, a corporation.
