GOOD SHOWING MADE AT P.H.S.

Rotarians See Business Department, Where Awards for Typewriting and Shorthand Convince One of School's Class

There was a splendid exhibit in the commercial department of the high school consisting of typewriting, shorthand, penmanship and book-keeping, for the Rotary club yesterday noon. Besides the exhibits the office-training department was in operation, the students taking and transcribing letters, filing letters, and performing various other forms of office work.

Among the interesting exhibits were the individual winnings of Dorothy Howard, Felix Rosas, Ida Mae Golze, and Arthur Sutherland. Dorothy Howard had the following: Remington and Underwood penman, 49-word L. C. Smith certificate, 40-word Underwood certificate, 40-word Remington card case, 60-word L. C. Smith certificate, 40-word Underwood card case, Remington Gold Medal certificate, Remington Gold Medal for 58 words per minute, gold medal won at Tucson during University week at 76 words, Underwood silver medal at 74.

Felix Rosas displayed the following: Remington 40 word card case, Underwood 40-word certificate, Underwood 60 word card case, Remington Gold Medal certificate, Remington gold medal at 58 words, Underwood Gold Medal at 85 words, a silver medal won at Tucson for second place in shorthand. He also had a Palmer Method, American Penman and Zaner Student Certificate for penmanship, and a diploma from the commercial department for proficiency in typewriting and shorthand.

Ida Mae Golze displayed: Underwood pennant, 49 word Remington card case, 40 word Underwood certificate, 40 word L. C. Smith certificate, 60 word Underwood card case, Remington Gold Medal certificate, won at 70 words per minute, and an O. G. shorthand certificate.

Arthur Sutherland exhibited: Underwood gold medal at 80 words, Remington Gold Medal certificate at 62, and an L. C. Smith certificate. The exhibits in the shorthand department consisted of the different shorthand certificates secured by the shorthand students. The following is taken from a letter written by John R. Gregg, author of the Gregg shorthand system, to Mrs. Jay: "The work of one of your students, Walter Brown, on the Gregg Writer examinations is being sent for exhibition purposes to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco."

Mrs. Gertrude Jay, one of the shorthand teachers in the high school, stands first in the contest being held for the Teacher's Gold Medal.

The picture of Tucker Pinney and Samuel Holsinger was displayed with the announcement that a letter had just been received by Mr. Michael from Samuel Holsinger stating that he had, in a public demonstration in Los Angeles, written 111 words net per minute for fifteen minutes. This remarkable record made by a high school student is within one word of the world's record only three years ago. Samuel Holsinger got his typewriting training in the Phoenix Union High school and says all his success as an operator is due to his training there. Tucker Pinney was said to be the best stenographer they had in the office at Stanford university.

A telegram was shown to the effect that forty final and improvement Palmer certificates for proficiency in penmanship were being awarded to students of the high school.

Scores of other awards of different kinds were exhibited, showing the work done by the students of the commercial department. In the penmanship and book-keeping rooms many beautiful specimens of penmanship and book-keeping were displayed.

QUARANTINE BARS TO BE RAISED TODAY

The governor's proclamation, raising the Arizona quarantine against shipments of live stock from all other states in the country with the exception of those which are or have become infected, will probably be issued today and will take effect at once. The resolution of the live stock sanitary board, recommending the removal of the quarantine, was transmitted to the governor yesterday.

Under the terms of the new proclamation, grain for seed and milling purposes will be admitted to Arizona on application to the state veterinarian, and the approval by that official of the shipment.

WATER DUES CAUSE A FLOCK OF PHONE CALLS

Assessment notices are being sent out to those members of the Salt River Valley Water Users' Association whose payments are due now. No such notices are being sent to those who have paid, but the cloud of telephone calls about them, have come about equally from those who paid and those who did not.

The following letter to subscribers is self explanatory:
You are hereby reminded that the current assessment against your land remains unpaid at this date. In accordance with the By-laws, this assessment becomes delinquent 30 days after the first Monday in May, or on June 2, 1915 and in accordance with the By-laws Article VIII, Section 16.

"Each assessment from the time it becomes delinquent shall bear interest at the rate of per cent per month, which interest shall be added to said assessment as a part thereof in case of sale or in case the owner shall pay his assessment before sale; provided, further, however, that in the event the land of a delinquent be not sold after having been on two successive days offered for sale as hereinafter provided, the rate of interest which shall be charged against his assessment and added as a part thereof shall, thereafter, be computed at the rate of 2 per cent per month."

The offer for sale will be made on August 16th 1915, after which the 2 per cent a month penalty begins.
This assessment includes an amount to complete the work of building power plants, an amount to refund power assessments paid on land finally ex-

cluded from the reservoir district, both in accordance with the authorization of the shareholders given at the regular election of April 7th, 1914, and also an amount for current association expenses, for the year ending Oct. 31, 1915 making a total of \$109 an acre. The assessment was levied May 1, 1914; the first half was due and payable Nov. 2nd, 1914, of which notice was mailed you according to the By-laws, and the second half was due May 3rd and payable within 30 days.

THOUSAND MILE RACE WILL BE IN AUTUMN

INDIANAPOLIS, May 20.—The Indianapolis motor speedway's proposed \$100,000 thousand-mile race may be held in the fall of 1916 or 1917, instead of in place of the regularly scheduled 500-mile event in the spring, as originally planned.

Race fans argue it would be a shame to disturb the regular sequence of 500-mile contests, now the world's greatest motoring feature, for even so great an event as the thousand-mile. The latter, they state, looks sufficiently attractive to make a hit as an extra venture any time. Official action on the proposition has not yet been taken, though it is thought an announcement will be made soon.
