EL PASO TRIMS SENATORS HITTING WHEN IT COUNTED PUT FIRST GAME ON ICE

Texans Make Fewer Hits, But by Bunching Them When Needed Bring Home Seven Runs, While Senators Get Three.

KITTY KNIGHT STUMBLING BLOCK

In Four Trips to Bat He Walloped Ball for Two Doubles and Single—McCreary Weakened in the Sixth Inning.

(Special to The Republican) EL PASO, Texas, June 15.—The Mackmen vindicated the east this afternoon at Rio Grande park, taking the initial game of the series from the Phoenix Senators in scrappy two hour session, by a score of seven to three.

Incidentally the local club regained a bit of prestige, lost in the recent western invasion of the club, by taking the first game of the series from the western club. A four hit, four run batting rally in the sixth inning was responsible for the victory, in which Kitty Knight was a prominent factor. He slammed out two doubles and a single in four trips to the plate. Johnny Pendleton, the fast little short stop, also lined the ball into deep left for a three bagger in the sixth, scoring two runs ahead of him.

McCreary the smoky right hander of the Senators opposed Young Ray Kallio, on the mound and did excellent work until the sixth inning, when four hits, an error, and a wild pitch led to four runs, and a double play pitched by Kallio proved exceptionally strong in the pinches. Men were on bases in practically every inning but died there as the right hander tightened and forced the next batter out. The local twirler was terser out. The local twirler was against nine off McCreary who gave a total of four bases on balls, and struck one batter, however.

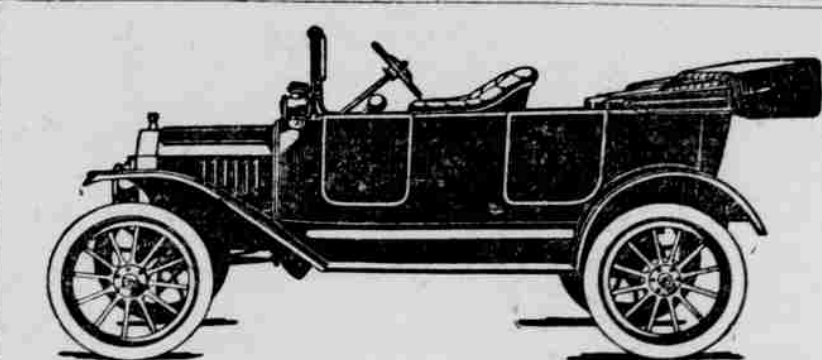
