RESOLUTION NO. 119

A resolution of the Commission of the City of Phoenix declaring their intention to improve certain portions of Adams and Monroe Streets and Twelfth and Thirteenth Avenues, and determining that bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses thereof, and declaring the work or improvement to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit and that the costs and expenses of said work shall be assessed upon a certain district and providing that the proposed work or improvement shall be done under the provisions of the Commission act of 1912, and subsequent amendments.

Section 1. That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the Commission of the City of Phoenix to order the following work to be done, to-wit:

1. That the roadway of Adams Street from the west line of Seventh Avenue, and the roadway of Monroe Street from the west line of Twelfth Avenue to the east line of Twelfth Avenue, and the roadway of Twelfth Avenue from the north line of Adams Street to the north line of Monroe Street, and the roadway of Adams Street to the south line of Monroe Street, and including all intersections of streets and alleys, work or improvement chargeable upon a district and hereby declared to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

The south one-half of original blocks 1 and 2 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Walker's Subdivision of Block 2 and the south 31.28 feet of Lot 14 of Walker's Subdivision of Block 3 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Block A and all of Block B, Woodland Place, a subdivision of Block 4 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the north one-half of Blocks 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Blocks 1 and 2, all of Blocks 7 and 8, and the north one-half of Blocks 3 and 10 in Capitol Addition to the City of Phoenix.

Section 2. That the City Engineer is hereby directed to make a diagram of the district described hereinabove in Section 1 of this Resolution of Intention, to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof. Such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece and parcel of land in said district and the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done.

Section 3. That a corrugated iron pipe, fifteen (15) inches in diameter, be laid across the roadway of Eighth Avenue on the south side of Adams Street, and across both sides of the roadway of Adams and Monroe Streets at the intersection of all avenues, on Adams Street between the west line of Seventh Avenue and the east line of Seventeenth Avenue, and on Monroe Street between the west line of Twelfth Avenue and the east line of Seventeenth Avenue, excepting at the intersections of Fifteenth Avenue and Adams Street and Twelfth Avenue and Monroe Street.

Section 4. That a corrugated iron pipe, twelve (12) inches in diameter, be laid across the roadway of Ninth Avenue on the north and south sides of Adams Street, and on both sides of Adams Street, at Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth Avenues, and on the south side of Adams Street at Fourteenth Avenue, and across all alleys and private drives wherever shown on the plans.

Section 5. That corrugated iron pipe, twenty-seven (27) inches in diameter, be laid across the roadways of Adams and Monroe Streets on the east side of Fifteenth Avenue.

Section 6. That corrugated iron pipe, eighteen (18) inches in diameter, be laid across the roadways of Adams and Monroe Streets on both the east and west sides of Sixteenth Avenue.

Section 7. That cement concrete standpipes be built and gates be set to control the flow of water at the following locations: at Eleventh Avenue and Adams Street, two (2); at Ninth Avenue and Adams Street, three (3); at Tenth Avenue and Adams Street, four (4); at Eleventh Avenue and Adams Street, four (4); at Twelfth Avenue and Adams Street, four (4); at Thirteenth Avenue and Adams Street, three (3); at Fourteenth Avenue and Adams Street, two (2); at Sixteenth Avenue and Adams Street, three (3); at Twelfth Avenue and Monroe Street, two (2); at Thirteenth Avenue and Monroe Street, two (2); at Sixteenth Avenue and Monroe, one (1).

Section 8. That cement concrete pipes of sizes to be specified on the plans be laid from the standpipes and corrugated iron pipes to a point six (6) feet back of property line as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to, and under all alleys and drives wherever shown on the plans.

Section 9. That gutter inlets be built to receive drainage water at the following locations: at Eleventh Avenue and Adams Street, two (2); at Fifteenth Avenue and Adams Street, six (6); at Seventeenth Avenue and Adams Street, two (2); at Fifteenth Avenue and Monroe Street, six (6); at Seventeenth Avenue and Monroe Street, two (2); and that said gutter inlets be connected to storm water manholes with the sizes of cement concrete pipes as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

Section 10. That storm water manholes be constructed at the following locations: at Eleventh Avenue and Adams Street, one (1); at Fifteenth Avenue and Adams Street, one (1); at Seventeenth Avenue and Adams Street, one (1); at Fifteenth Avenue and Monroe Street, one (1); at Seventeenth Avenue and Monroe Street, one (1).

Section 11. That the roadway of intersecting streets be graded from the edge of the pavement to the center of the street to a depth of ten (10) feet, and to exceed the original surface of the street.

Section 12. That the work to be done in accordance with that certain set of plans approved and adopted by the Commission of the City of Phoenix on the 15th day of June 1915 and on file in the Office of the City Engineer in Book Two of Street Improvement Plans, on pages 73 to 58 inclusive and in further accordance with Specifications Numbers 19, 21, 22, 24, 25 and 28 on file in the Office of the City Clerk of said City and which said plans and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of the said work and made a part hereof.

Section 13. That the said contemplated work or improvement, in the opinion of the Commission is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and that said Commission hereby makes the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district and hereby declares that the district in said City of Phoenix benefited by the said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

The south one-half of original blocks 1 and 2 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Walker's Subdivision of Block 2 and the south 31.28 feet of Lot 14 of Walker's Subdivision of Block 3 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Block A and all of Block B, Woodland Place, a subdivision of Block 4 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the north one-half of Blocks 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 of Neahr's Addition to the City of Phoenix; the south one-half of Blocks 1 and 2, all of Blocks 7 and 8, and the north one-half of Blocks 3 and 10 in Capitol Addition to the City of Phoenix.

after their date until all is paid, and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July respectively, of each year, at the rate of six per cent per annum on all sums unpaid until the whole of the said principal sum and interest are paid.

Section 5. The serial bonds herein mentioned shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of Arizona, known and designated as the "Improvement Act of 1912," approved May 17th, 1912, and all the proceedings in the aforementioned improvements shall also be taken under said "Improvement Act of 1912" and subsequent amendments.

Section 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Resolution of Intention, and shall cause the same to be published ten (10) times in the Arizona Republican, a daily newspaper published and circulated in the city of Phoenix and hereby designated for that purpose.

Section 7. The Superintendent of Streets of the City of Phoenix shall post notices of said proposed improvement as required by law, and in said notices shall refer to this Resolution of Intention.

Reference is hereby made to the Rituistic License Agreement of Warren Brothers, Company, of Boston, Mass., dated June 18, 1915, on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Phoenix.

POTATOES HARD TO EQUAL ARE RAISED WITHOUT IRRIGATION

Small Desert Claim Raises Finest Spuds Seen in These Parts in Some Time — Other Crops in Same Proportion

Encouragement for the dry farmer, with a small desert claim, is the gospel of J. P. Saunders in preaching. He wandered into The Republican office Saturday afternoon, bearing a paper bag, closely held to his breast, as if containing jewels of priceless value.

He slowly unwrapped the twine around the bag and much to the consternation of the office force he produced a great big healthy looking potato.

"It didn't take much questioning to get the story of that luscious spud and its equally luscious looking companions. 'Those potatoes were grown on the desert, with no more water than the clouds furnished,' stated Mr. Saunders.

"Well, how did you do it," came the query. "Two years ago," he said, "I was working as an expert in a small mining camp near Phoenix, when I was taken down with fever, and was sick for months. I am the father of eight children, and they had to be taken care of. I was unable to work at my trade, and they were all young and dependent on me. I made up my mind that the only way to regain my health was to get out on the ranch where I could be out of doors all the time. I had no money with which to purchase land, and began to look for desert land to homestead.

"There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that a successful living can be made on dry farms here, if it is done about in a proper and enthusiastic manner. I have about recovered my health, and when I get my land cleared, it will be on a par with the best of the irrigated lands."

THRIPS DAMAGE SEVERAL CROPS

Arizona Commission of Agriculture and Horticulture Send Out Circular Dealing With Extermination of Little Pests

The wheat thrips, which might more appropriately be called the flower thrips, has done considerable damage in Arizona this season. Fruits of various kinds have suffered severely, more especially blackberries in the Salt River valley. Perhaps the most persistent demand received at the office of the State Entomologist is for a remedy for the blighting of rose buds. More or less damage of this kind is done by the thrips every spring and in this circular suggestions are made for the benefit of the rose garden.

The species of thrips here referred to is an orange yellow insect which is usually about a twenty-fifth of an inch long in the adult stage. The nymph or immature form is pale yellow in color. In form the insect is slender and often is described as "worm-like." The young nymph is so small that it can find its way beneath the petals of a very small rose but, even before there is any opening visible to the naked eye.

There is no way of controlling these insects on rose bushes by spraying or by any application to the plants. In at least some cases, however, perfect rose blossoms can be produced by persistently picking off each blighted bud as soon as it is evident that it is effected. When the infected buds are allowed to remain upon the plants the eggs of the thrips, which are evidently laid at the bases of the petals, hatch and the young insects reach maturity after which they scatter to the new buds as fast as they appear, increasing in numbers many times faster than the buds. By removing the buds as here advised and destroying them by burning thousands of the young insects may be destroyed before they reach the adult or winged stage. The writer has succeeded by the method described in growing perfect roses on bushes where previously all the buds were regularly blighted as fast as they appeared and at a time when no other perfect roses could be found in the neighborhood.

The rose grower should examine the flowers of all plants in the garden and such as prove to be particularly attractive to the thrips should be given special attention. Whether subject to noticeable injury or not every kind of flower which is attacked by the pest should be picked regularly and every bud and blossom destroyed by burning as soon as possible after it passes its prime. These insects are very fond of sweet pea blossoms and by planting sweet peas near roses and picking the flowers of the former regularly and burning them after they have done service as cut flowers a good many of the thrips which would otherwise confine their attention to the rose buds may be attracted away and virtually trapped. Fortunately, while the sweet peas are very attractive to the thrips no noticeable injury is done to them.

Station Agent Finds Body of Man Who Died En Route to Los Angeles; Letter Only Clue to Identity

Considerable excitement was caused at Maricopa last night by the sudden death of an unknown man occurring in the waiting room of the Southern Pacific.

His clothes were searched, disclosing a letter addressed to George Hibbons, P. O. Box 920, Phoenix. That is the only clue to his identification. An effort was made last night in Phoenix to find some relatives or friends, but none were located. He was traveling on a ticket to Los Angeles, and left here last night on the 7:35 train. The coroner of Pinal county was called and ordered the body taken to Tempe and placed in charge of an undertaker there. It was disclosed by an examination last night that he was a sufferer from tuberculosis.
