Betty Nansen Superb at Lamara

It was of Betty Nansen that the great Ibsen wrote, "She does not act, she is." It is this marvelous woman who is today as yesterday portraying the greatest of Tolstoy's characters in the film play that is being seen at the Lamara theater. She is one of the greatest tragediennes in the world, and that she was obtained by the William Fox Film corporation for a series of filmings in the United States, of those great plays that demand an actress of special type and ability to properly present, is considered one of that company's greatest achievements. So great was the interest in her trip to the western hemisphere that a great delegation of Scandinavians, including the Danish minister to the United States, were at the pier at New York to greet the royal actress. She is a woman of unusual charm, wonderful ability and great power. In her many scenes she rises to heights of artistry rarely seen in silent drama.

The picture at the Lamara theater is "Anna Karenina," the favorite characterization of the immortal Russian. This is the story with which he shocked the world. Like the "Kreutzer Sonata," it deals with the triangle situation—two men and a woman. The woman dares all for the man she loves, to whom she cannot be married by reason of the fact that she is the wife of the prime minister of the Russian empire. Then the inevitable happens and the end of it all is that the woman throws herself beneath a railroad train, having lost in the fight with the conventions of society and the laws of God.

It is a masterpiece of a picture, exceptional even for the Lamara.

Fresh Water Day
"Fresh Water Day at Riverside", that means the big pool was emptied and scrubbed last night and today will be full of clean fresh water day. The kiddies love Monday mornings because the water is not deep and they can wade around in the shallows and make the most of the short time that condition exists. By three in the afternoon there is six feet of water in the pool and it is full and overflowing early in the evening. At no bathing place in the country is there more care taken to keep the place clean and sanitary than at Riverside. The water used is all

"drinking water," and the best drinking water in the valley at that. Hundreds of families use it in their homes every day, some even come from many miles out on McDowell road to carry a carboy of it back with them.

As usual on Mondays, the park is open to women and children under 12 until four o'clock in the afternoon. There will be an orchestral concert at seven tonight, moving pictures at 8:15 and dancing at 9 p. m.

AT THE DARDANELLES

Truth, which records his present duties, congratulates Sir Ian Hamilton on having such a practical officer at the head of his staff in the difficult operations in which he is now engaged.
