

DECISION ON GERMAN DRAFT UP TO WILSON

Although He Has Not Authorized Any Indication of His Views, It is Not Believed Informal Proposals Will Be Accepted

FORMAL REPLY IS EXPECTED SHORTLY

United States May Maintain Silence as to Unsatisfactory Proposals and Refuse to Engage in Any Discussion

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Upon the president rests the decision as to what reply, if any, will be sent to Ambassador Gerard's message outlining the tentative draft of the note submitted to him informally by Germany as a proposed reply to the American note of June's on submarine warfare.

During the day Count von Bernstorff who returned to Washington, tendered his congratulations to Lansing and inquired concerning the latest phases of negotiation at Berlin through Gerard.

Although officials are reticent regarding Gerard's conversation with the German foreign office functionaries, it is said his message does not make clear whether the German government had asked him to obtain the views of the United States on a tentative draft.

The implication was the American government could if it chose, comment on it before the note was completed. As a result of his conference, the ambassador asked if the state department had any instructions for him.

Whether this will take the form of a message saying the department had no instructions for him to express a view is undecided tonight.

NO HOLT BOMBS ON SAXONIA IS WORD RECEIVED

Fears for Safety of Gun-warder Are Dissipated When Wireless Is Received Saying No Bombs Have Been Discovered

NEW YORK, July 7.—Fears for the safety of the Carnarvon Saxonia were dissipated when a wireless message saying that no bombs are aboard was received from the captain in answer to a warning sent that Frank Holt asserted that this boat or the steamship Philadelphia were in danger from internal explosions.

Mr. Holt was declared on typhoid fever in Phoenix. The city health department has inaugurated a campaign against further epidemics from sources which the department can control.

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KING'S ENVOY UNDER ARREST AT PORTLAND

Jovo Macanovich, Who Says He is Personal Representative of King of Montenegro, Charged With Violating Neutrality

HAS ENLISTED 3000 RESERVISTS

Before He and His Secretary Are Released Train Bearing Reservists from Arizona Arrives and is Halted for Three Hours

PORTLAND, July 7.—Jovo Macanovich, who says he is the personal representative of the King of Montenegro and J. M. Laburich, his secretary, who were arrested yesterday on a telegraphic warrant from Chicago, charging them with conspiracy to violate the neutrality of the United States, were released today on bonds of \$10,000 each.

Mr. Macanovich is the personal secretary of the King, said Laburich, and he knows international law. He swears ago he represented Montenegro in Constantinople. We have violated no law.

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BELIEVE COLOR JOINING PLAN NIPPED IN BUD

However, Washington Officials Say No Intention to Prevent Departure of Recruits, But Will Prosecute Those Responsible

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Although department of justice officials are confident they have tipped the plan to ship large numbers of Montenegrins back home to join the colors, it is said tonight there is no present intention of preventing the departure of those induced to start home.

The officials are not surprised the recruits stopped at Portland were allowed to proceed. It is said the efforts of the government are directed chiefly to the conviction of the representatives of the Montenegrin government charged with the violation of neutrality by urging their compatriots to return home.

The cases probably will be laid before the federal authorities in Chicago where much evidence was obtained from recruits stopped on a train bound for Canada. The activity of the government in these arrests is part of a general effort to prevent the enlistments in the United States for armies of the belligerent nations.

FOOD SHORTAGE STILL SERIOUS BUT BREAD RIOTING IS CHECKED

Dispatches from Mexico City Received by State Department Say Feeling of Unrest Likely to Lead to Chaos

GONZALEZ AWAITS REINFORCEMENTS

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TEN DEAD IN WRECK

QUEENSTOWN, July 7.—Ten persons were killed and a score injured tonight when a trolley car of the Inland National Railway jumped the track at a curve on the sharp incline leading from Queenstown Heights into the village. The car was carrying a crowd of excursionists to the boat landing.

ESCAPED TO MEXICO

TOWNSVILLE, July 7.—A band of about 20 Mexicans, which raided North Cameron county early this week, have succeeded in crossing to Mexico in the opinion of the sheriff. Posses are still searching for the gang.

PREDICTION OF NATION WIDE PROHIBITION IN FIVE YEARS

ATLANTIC CITY, July 7.—Stirring addresses were delivered against liquor traffic at today's session of the convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America, and predictions were made that national prohibition would be achieved by 1920 if the sentiment for a sobriest nation continues to grow as it has in the last two years.

Forty state superintendents of the League addressed two meetings held simultaneously and told of the progress being made to bring about a complete suppression of the liquor traffic.

IMPRISONMENT FOR RAISING PRICES

MUNICH, July 7.—The military authorities of Bavaria today issued an ordinance providing a maximum of one year's imprisonment for dealers charging excessively for articles of daily consumption.

HUERTA MAY BE GIVEN FREEDOM WITHOUT TRIAL

Reported Will Not Be Prosecuted if He Will Take Up His Residence Somewhere in Northern Part of States

WASHINGTON, July 7.—There were indications tonight that the cross against Huerta might be dropped.

Huerta is due to appear for hearing next week. Officials are reticent regarding reports that he will not prosecute if Huerta will take up his residence somewhere in the northern part of the United States and not interfere in Mexican politics.

Still Seeking Bail EL PASO, July 7.—Huerta attorneys tonight continued negotiations with the federal officials in an effort to have Huerta and his five associates released on bail.

Has Strong Case

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TORNADO LEAVES TRAIL OF DEATH IN MIDDLE WEST

Accompanied by Cloudburst Storm Sweeps Eastward from St. Louis, Killing Score and Leveling Several Towns

HEAVIEST RAIN IN GENERATION

St. Charles Suffers Most With More Than Hundred Square Blocks Damaged and Electric Plant Out of Commission

ST. LOUIS, July 7.—Severe storms are known to have been killed during the tornado and cloudburst at St. Charles. A woman and child who who entered the Bertram church at St. Charles, just as it was demolished by the storm, have not been accounted for.

The tornado and cloudburst swept St. Louis and St. Charles county. The property damage amounts to half a million. A number of small towns are isolated. Parts of the territory were deluged with four inches of rain in half an hour.

The storm came from the southwest but as it struck the city it swerved to the north and swept the entire central portion. The first volley of wind was followed by the heaviest rain in a generation.

News From Chicago

CHICAGO, July 7.—Tornadoes and cloudbursts sweeping eastward from the Missouri river caused heavy damage and loss of life today in Missouri, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

ALAMEDA, July 7.—Six inmates of the California Girl's Training School mutinied tonight, extended the mutiny to sixty or seventy-five girls, and ran escaped. Four were captured, and two are still fugitives.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—William J. Bryan explained his delay in taking a stand on the suffrage question and suggested a method of campaigning for it, in an address before the women of the San Francisco and California Civil League luncheon.

He said: "Let me give you argument for those who question the morality and intelligence of giving the ballot to women. More than ninety percent of the inmates of the Nebraska penitentiary are men. You find a majority of women in the churches. If women are intelligent enough to keep out of the penitentiary and have morality enough to go to church, there is no question of their fitness for the ballot. I believe it is only a question of time when women will share the burdens of government with men. Ethical standards will be brought more and more into play."
