GIBBONS GETS ONE YEAR IN PRISON IN SPITE OF FRIENDS

Tom Gibbons, dragged down in the swirl of crime set in motion by Harvey Melosh, adjudged by a jury of his peers to be guilty of the felony of receiving stolen goods, yesterday stood before Judge Stanford to receive a sentence of from one to two years in the penitentiary.

To the last minute Gibbons was the smiling, debonaire well dressed young man, so much admired and looked up to by the score or more of young men in his set.

When the motion was refused, Gibbons showed no sign that the last barrier between himself and the prison at Florence had been let down, and that the way to confinement behind the great gray walls was open and clear ahead of him.

The judge called him forward, asked him if he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed. Gibbons hung his head for a minute as if contemplating what to say, and then shook his head in the negative.
