A meeting of the Arizona Press Association has been called for January 1st, the date of the assembling of the Arizona Legislature.

For a party that boasts of having deemed every promise, the territorial condition of Arizona gives the platform to the last two national platforms the Republicans.

The center of population in 1890 was at Westport, Indiana. According to the late census the center is now at Columbus, Indiana, eighteen miles west than Westport.

The next territorial legislature will be the 21st. As we are now of age and have the necessary qualifications in the way of wealth and population, Congress will please admit us to the sisterhood of States.

The Tribune is glad to note that the Phoenix Republican has changed its opinion about the San Carlos dam being a failure. It admits that no other irrigation legislation can be had from the present Congress.

It was often said during the election at the Philippines would immediately lay down their arms when McKinley was reelected, but like the Republican promise of statehood for Arizona, conditions are different, and the called rebels are indulging in more separate fighting than ever.

The Chicago Times-Herald truthfully says: "When in his letter to the irrigation Congress General Miles said at private or corporate enterprise should not be trusted with the water monopoly in the arid regions of the west, he expressed a sentiment that I meet with a chorus of approval every State and Territory where irrigation is employed. There is work great magnitude to be done which would be impossible to any other agency than the Federal Government."

DISPATCHES from Washington leave little doubt that something will be done for the Pima Indians at the present short session of Congress. The Indian appropriation bill has passed the House and is now in the hands of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, which Senator John M. Thurston of Nebraska is chairman. Mr. Thurston made a study of the situation, and with us for the San Carlos dam, his proposition is to amend the Indian appropriation bill in the Senate, adding a clause for the construction of the San Carlos dam, and to stay with through thick and thin. This we believe will be done. Along in the fall the editor of the Tribune wrote to Senator Thurston, inviting him here to a sub-committee to examine the situation. This was his reply:

COMMITTEE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS, UNITED STATES SENATE, WASHINGTON, Sept. 10, 1900. DEAR OLD FRIEND: I have yours of the 6th inst. Nothing would please me better than to take a sub-committee and go down and examine the Pima agency situation, but so far as I am personally concerned it will be impossible. There are reasons why I cannot remain in Washington for the next month, and after that I expect to be rushed and worked almost to death in the campaign. It is possible that in November, I might arrange for an investigation. I doubt if I could get a sub-committee of the committee on Indian Affairs to go to Arizona between now and election, as all senators will be very busy and their services needed at home or in the campaign. Falling in getting the sub-committee here, we have spared no pains in helping Mr. Thurston and his committee thoroughly posted in the matter, so they are now well acquainted with the conditions, and as a natural consequence favor the construction of the dam. There is absolutely no argument against it, and all that was necessary was to present the facts, which has been done as carefully and persistently as possible. If we have annoyed any honorable senators and caused them to say "dam" when they didn't mean it, we are sorry—but we must have that dam.

The New York Commercial Advertiser says: "The Government experts have surveyed the arid lands, measured the water supply and made estimates as to the cost of increasing or regulating the latter. All that Congress is asked to do now is to make a beginning. It is believed that such success will follow the building of one storage reservoir that the advisability of others will never be questioned, and that they will thereafter be built wherever opportunity presents and the financial resources of the National Government allow."

C. C. RANDOLPH writes to the Republican from Washington that nothing will be accomplished for irrigation of the arid lands at the present session of Congress. Our only hope lies in statehood, when we will have two votes in the Senate and one in the House. And that contingency seems in the dim distance. We might as well be Porto Ricans and be done with it.

Antiquity of Anatomical Study. Sir Norman Lockyer points out that the statues and plaques carved in stone and wood to be seen in the Gizeh museum prove that the priest-mummifiers of Memphis 6,000 years ago had a profound knowledge of anatomy. Science, he therefore thinks, is as old as art, and they have advanced together. Another remarkable fact is that the excavations in Italy have brought to light scores of finely finished surgical instruments for certain operations which are in almost every particular of form precisely like those reinvented in modern times and used by the most advanced surgeons of to-day.

Women Rulers. Considerably more than half the human race is ruled by women. Two women—the empress dowager of China and the queen of England—alone govern about half the entire population of the world. The third in importance is young Queen Wilhelmina of Holland, whose home land numbers less than 5,000,000 souls, but whose colonies have 30,000,000. Spain is ruled by a woman, Queen Regent Christina, in the minority of her son. It is expected that the queen mother Margherita will have great influence over her son's kingdom, but her case is not needed to establish the preponderance of woman-ruled races.

Does Mining Pay?

[From the Globe Silver Belt.] In a talk the other day between some well known mining men, in relation to the mineral deposits in Arizona and the depth in which the paying ores are found in our richest miner, the following interesting facts were elicited and noted down at the time:

The United Verde mine, at Jerome, with shafts and drifts on it 100 feet deep, was offered for sale a few years ago without a buyer. At last W. A. Clark, of Montana, took the property, and after sinking to 300 feet, he had 98 feet of solid ore, and at 500 feet, it is reported the ore body is 400 feet wide. Clark has refused \$100,000,000 for this mine.

The Congress mine, at 150 feet, was considered as a fraud by no less a personage than "Diamond Joe," and now at 2,500 feet, it is held for \$3,000,000.

The Fortuna mine, at 150 feet, was bought by Charles Lane for \$140,000. Now, at a depth of 600 feet, you could not buy it for \$3,000,000.

The King of Arizona was sold for but \$30,000 when at a depth of 100 feet, while to-day, with a depth of 500 feet, it is held at \$1,000,000.

The famous Copper Queen mine at Bisbee, at a depth of 200 feet, was about to be sold for debt. Now, at 800 feet, it has sufficient ore in sight to run fifty years, and money cannot buy it.

The Crowned King mine was \$23,000 in debt when down 165 feet. Now, at a depth of 500 feet, all paid and regular dividends declared, it cannot be purchased for less than \$1,000,000.

The Pearce mine was sold for \$275,000 when a depth of 150 feet had been reached. It is now producing \$150,000 annually, and is not for sale.

You hear mining men speak of the ledge of the United Verde. There is no ledge there, and there never was one. On the surface there was a large number of small strata, which lead from the surface to the great deposit in the heart of the mountain. These stringers were sent out merely to invite the prospector's pick. You hear the ledge of the Verde variously estimated at from 250 to 500 feet in width. There is, as a matter of fact, no end to the great deposit or zone up to the present development of the mine. The expression, "There is a mountain of it," which you often hear in the hills, can be applied to the Verde with impunity. It is without question the biggest mine in the world. If it were more favorably located, it would today be a greater copper producer than the Calumet & Hecla.
