

COPPER CREEK MAY BECOME GREAT CAMP

Eastern Syndicates Are Taking Hold of Properties of Promise Situate in Yavapai Districts.

Niagara and Copper Penny Are Under Bond and Generally Speaking a Wave of Confidence Prevails.

In the opinion of John H. Hise, a mining engineer of many years' experience in many of the principal mining camps of the west, the Copper creek and Boulder sections are destined within the next few years to be among the leading copper producing camps of the entire territory.

Speaking of the future prospects of that locality he said: "Being isolated from railroad transportation, these districts have until lately attracted but little attention until the large copper mining syndicates of the east taking cognizance of the fact that Arizona was bound in a short time to be the leading copper producing state of the west, became anxious to get control of some of the immense and undeveloped deposits, and sent representatives into this remote region, who, recognizing its great mineral worth, gave good reports of its future mineral possibilities with scientific development."

"As a result of the visits of the mining engineers employed by these syndicates, the American Mining and Exploration company, which is composed of some of the leading capitalists and the wealthiest men in the country, has secured bonds on the Copper Penny, the Niagara, and other groups of mines, besides a number of other good prospects and are now engaged in making preparations for the execution of extensive plans of development on a scale so immense that its importance can be hardly realized by those who are interested in the development of the country."

"Another large concern has also secured a bond on the Lawler group of Copper creek, and the development of these mines is now under way."

"The mineralized zone of the Copper creek district covers a belt about six miles in length and about three miles in width. It appears to be a country of great upheavals in ages gone by, with no particular trend of formation. Large dikes of porphyry, slate and iron follow the granite and porphyry contacts, in which veins of oxide, black sulphide of copper, and grey copper occur from one to twelve inches in thickness, carrying good values, the oxides disappearing as depth is reached."

"A number of camps are in operation in the Boulder creek section, which is almost similar in formation to that of the Copper creek locality."

These districts are situated about 28 miles in a northeasterly direction from Hillsdale station on the S. F. & P., in the Bureka mining district, which has long enjoyed a reputation for immense and valuable mineral deposits, but the development of which has been retarded by the lack of transportation facilities. Outside of this drawback the place is admirably situated for mining operations, water being plentiful in the creeks and streams traversing the country."

Mr. Hise left yesterday for his mining camp after a visit to Prescott of several days.

NEW RAILROAD FOR NORTHERN ARIZONA

The Review is in possession of reliable information that the Santa Fe company is now having made a survey that means there will probably be a new railroad in northern Arizona that not only will open up a fine mineral and grazing country but will change the main line of the Santa Fe for a few hundred miles to where the stream pours its waters into Bill Williams Fork. Bill Williams Fork will be followed to the valley of the Colorado and then the road will cut straight across that level stretch of country leaving the Bill Williams, and going straight to Parker on the Colorado.

"That is the point which the Arizona & Colorado, another of the Santa Fe lines, reaches. It pushes west from Wickenburg and while it has a much more mountainous section to work through it is being rapidly built and will probably be in operation to the Colorado some time in 1907."

At Parker a bridge will span the Colorado and from there a way will be picked through the mountains passes to Slam on the main line. The line from Wickenburg will give this section a more direct route to northern Arizona than the Santa Fe now possesses while the other will give

the Santa Fe system an easy grade from Slam to Ash Fork.

The section of the country to be traversed from Banghart is not a new country from a mining standpoint as it has been prospected quite freely and is known to be richly mineralized. The Santa Maria valley and the Bill Williams valley are both fertile and the country which is now sparsely settled because of the lack of transportation will be one of the well settled sections of Arizona. The ranges there are good and are already occupied by many herds that will increase with the Los Angeles market made so handy to them.

A PROCLAMATION. By the Governor of Arizona.

Of an Order for an Election for Voting for Delegates to a Proposed Convention for the Formation of a Constitution for the Proposed State of Arizona to be Composed of New Mexico and Arizona as now constituted, and to Vote Upon the Question of the proposed Jointure.

To the Qualified Electors of the Territory of Arizona, and to Whomsoever Else it may Concern:

KNOW YE: That heretofore, to-wit: on the fourteenth day of July, 1906, by virtue and direction of, and in accordance with, the provisions of an act of Congress entitled:

"An Act to enable the people of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory to form a constitution and State government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States; and to enable the people of New Mexico and of Arizona to form a constitution and State government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States," approved June 16, 1906,

the Governor, the Chief Justice, and the Secretary of the Territory of Arizona apportioned the 44 delegates proposed under the provisions of said act of Congress to be elected from Arizona, who, together with the 66 delegates proposed to be elected from New Mexico, may constitute a convention for said Territories of New Mexico and Arizona to form a constitution for the proposed State of Arizona, among the several counties of Arizona as follows:

To Apache county..... 1 delegate
To Cochise county..... 8 delegates
To Coconino county..... 2 delegates
To Gila county..... 3 delegates
To Graham county..... 5 delegates
To Maricopa county..... 8 delegates
To Mohave county..... 1 delegate
To Navajo county..... 1 delegate
To Pima county..... 4 delegates
To Pinal county..... 1 delegate
To Santa Cruz county..... 1 delegate
To Yavapai county..... 7 delegates
To Yuma county..... 2 delegates

AND KNOW YE FURTHER by this Proclamation: That under the authority, and by the direction, of the provisions of said act of Congress, it has been by the Governor of Arizona, and is now by this Proclamation, ordered: That at the general election to be held in the said Territory of Arizona on the 6th day of November, 1906, the said Delegates apportioned to the said convention as aforesaid, shall be voted for by the electors qualified to vote at said general election, in the said several counties.

And it is further ordered: That there shall also be submitted to the qualified electors at said general election, a question which shall be stated on the same ballot on which the names of candidates for Delegates to the convention aforesaid are printed in substance and form as follows:

"Shall Arizona and New Mexico be united to form one State?" "Yes." "No."

Electors desiring to vote in the affirmative of that question shall place a cross mark in the square to the left of the word "Yes"; and those desiring to vote in the negative shall place a cross mark in the square to the left of the word "No" in the form above prescribed.

Such election shall be conducted in all respects as prescribed by the laws of the said Territory of Arizona governing general elections.

The returns of said election for Delegates to the proposed constitutional convention shall be made, and the certificates of persons elected thereto issued, as near as may be in the same manner as is prescribed by the laws of the Territory of Arizona regulating the elections therein of members of the Legislative Assembly of said Territory, and as is further prescribed by said act of Congress.

And the result of the said election upon the question above directed to be submitted to the electors at said election shall be ascertained, returned, and duly certified, as near as it is practicable to be done, in the manner prescribed by the laws of this Territory for the ascertainment, return and certification of the results of the election for Delegate to Congress, and as further prescribed by said act of Congress.

And the several precinct, county and Territorial officers in the Territory who are charged by law with any duties relating to general elections are, so far as those duties are applicable to the election hereby ordered, and not inconsistent with said act of Congress, likewise charged with the performance thereof in respect to this election; and in addition thereto, such other duties in respect thereto as are prescribed by the provisions of said act of Congress.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, JOSEPH H. KIBBEY, Governor of Arizona, have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the Capital, this fourteenth day of July, A. D. 1906.

CONSUL POOH POOSH THE TROUBLE RUMORS

Acting Mexican Consul A. M. Corona is one person well informed on conditions in Mexico who appears to take little stock in the reports which are reaching the United States from all points in Mexico, that September 16 would witness an uprising of Mexicans against foreigners. He also says the statement that Governor Ysabel and the governors of other states in Mexico have been called to the capital city to consult with President Diaz about the alleged impending uprising is untrue. Says Mr. Corona:

"The visit of the Mexican governors to the City of Mexico has no significance, for once a year they go to the capital to consult with the president on general matters. The present visit of Governor Ysabel is his regular annual trip—nothing more—and has no connection with the reported anti-gringo sentiment."

"The recent trouble at Cananea, if traced down to its true origin, would be found to have been caused by meddling Americans. Left to themselves the Mexicans are harmless. Ambitious, all they care for is their beans and teguila. The slightest disorder among those of the lower class can be quelled by the uplifting of a hand by a person of superior station. But let one of their own class step in and endeavor to pacify them their disorder will increase. They are an easy people to govern and trouble is easily put down."
