TOMBSTONE, ARIZONA, May 24, 1882.

TO LARKIN W. CARR, Foreman of the Grand Jury of Cochise County, now in session:

The undersigned committee, appointed by you to examine the County Recorder's and Clerk's offices, wish to submit the following report:

We found the records of the county kept in a neat and satisfactory manner, and the charges, as far as we could ascertain, were reasonable and not above that allowed by statute.
