

### Vaccination Urgent Need of People Say Surgeon General And Health Officer of State

Believing that the anti-vaccination petitions recently circulated in Arizona would have some bearing for want of signatures, had the signers thereof known the attitude of the medical department of the United States army toward vaccination, State Health officer O. H. Brown, has inaugurated a campaign to educate the people of Arizona to the need of the compulsory vaccination law purely as a war measure.

Dr. Brown is confident that in the matter of keeping themselves physically fit and healthy, and helping to keep down disease in the army, that the voters of Arizona are just as patriotic as in the matter of subscribing for liberty bonds, or any others of the many war interests.

The fact of the matter is that to vote for the abolition of the present compulsory vaccination law is to refuse to support the medical staff of the United States army and navy in their efforts to keep the army and navy up to the highest standard of efficiency. If you do not believe that statement, read the following telegram received by Dr. Brown, as state health officer, from Surgeon General Rupert Blue, of the United States public health service.

Washington, D. C., March 8, 1918.

Supt. of Public Health, Phoenix, Arizona.

Urgently advise promulgation of orders by State Board of Health requiring school children throughout Arizona. Re-vaccination of adults should be urged. This order is essential as a war measure and for industrial efficiency, especially in view of constant occurrence of measles and large per cent unvaccinated population. Other states have responded to recommendations this character. Public health service ready to render any assistance to maintain proper health standards at this most critical period. (Signed) BLUE, Surgeon General.

There is the whole thing in a nut-

shell. Just as the army and navy vaccinate their own men—not only with one but with two kinds of serum—so they put it up to the people "back home" to see that public health is insured by requiring vaccination of both children and grownups.

To vote for a repeal of the present law making vaccination compulsory, is to put narrow minded hobby and personal prejudice above national welfare and patriotism. Everyone of the thousands of soldiers that Arizona has sent into the service, has been vaccinated. The vaccinations that they have to undergo are far more rigorous than that for smallpox, and yet not one case of complications afterward has developed. One who stays at home and voted against vaccination places himself in the position of saying "Sure I'm patriotic, I wave the flag and buy bonds, but when it comes down to sacrificing my personal views for the good of the cause, there's where I stop. Let the boys go to the front and carry on the fight, and submit to the horrors (?) of vaccination, but as for me—my patriotism stops here."

The state board of health and council of defense urge all voters to stand behind the army and navy—our boys in the service on the land and sea—in the end that the present compulsory vaccination laws are left on the statute books of the state. It is a war measure—the army wants it enforced—and for that reason all voters are urged to vote against the initiative petition repealing the present compulsory vaccination laws.

**PLANS ALL AWRY**  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Plans for an adjournment of congress until after election appeared tonight to have been blocked by partisan conflict in the senate. Less than a quorum of the senate is in Washington tonight and republican leaders said they would exercise their power to prevent the proposed recess in order that the senate may discuss any developments in the peace negotiations. Democratic leaders were understood to be prepared to forestall another outbreak of partisan debate by making a point of no quorum. It was conceded by republican members that the democratic plans could be carried out, thus forcing an adjournment of the senate from day to day. Introduction of resolutions bearing on proposals of the central powers is expected tomorrow, but in view of the power possessed by either party to force an adjournment no discussion of the resolutions is expected. Because of the situation in the senate it was considered doubtful whether house leaders would attempt passage tomorrow of an election recess resolution, causing a continuation of the existing three day recess schedule.

### 33,000 TOTAL PRISONERS IN LATEST DRIVE

captured 33,000 of the enemy, including 192 officers. In Albania the Italians have occupied San Giovanni Di Medua and are advancing on Scutari. East of the Piave river the Italians have reached Vittorio. The text of the communication follows:

"Our offensive extended southward from the middle Piave yesterday. A third army has now entered the struggle. On the front from the Brenta to the sea three-quarters of the Italian army are fighting in brotherly fashion with a gallant French division and the young and daring 332d American infantry regiment.

"Between the Brenta and Piave rivers the bitterness of the resistance and the aggressiveness of the enemy, supported by fresh reserves have for six days given the struggle particular fierceness.

"East of the Piave the enemy is pinned in the progress and we are overrunning extensive lines. In the Gressina region yesterday our troops won marked advantages in the region of Feltre and Col di Orso. The French army has captured the outskirts of the village of Quaro, taken gorges and carried Mont Cosen.

"The eighth army has occupied the hills of Follina and reached Vittorio, here is fighting north of Conegliano.

"The Italian tenth army is beyond the Conegliano-Oderzo road. The third army has crossed the Piave to San Dona Di Piave and east of Zenson.

"The prisoners captured since Thursday number 392 officers and 32,985 men. Of whom several hundred have been taken. It has been impossible to calculate the number of machine guns and the quantity of material captured."

**TRAINED AT CHILLICOTHE.**
