

WILL DEMUR TO TRUE BILLS FOR PERJURY TODAY

Believed That Special Grand Jury Will Be Called If Court Sustains Demurrers.

CONTINUANCE WILL BE TAKEN TILL JUNE TERM

New Mexico Land Cases Will Not Come to Trial This Year; Green Found Guilty of Violating Edmunds Act.

MEET PAY ROLLS WITH REAL COIN

Two Companies at Least Distribute Genuine Money to Employes.

The trials of those recently indicted for perjury by the federal grand jury will not take place during the present session of court, according to an authentic report. It is understood that the United States prosecutors and the attorneys for the defense have reached an agreement that the trials will be continued until the June session of the federal court.

Assistant Attorney General Peyton Gordon, who was sent out from Washington to press the charges against the Phelps Dodge company, leaves this morning for Santa Fe, which is taken as ample corroboration of the report that the cases will not come to trial during the present term of court. It is said that the prosecution is not yet ready to proceed with the trials and it is certain that the defense has not had time to prepare for them.

There were no new developments in the land cases yesterday, although what purported to be facts as to the Edmunds-Tucker act were made known last evening, showing that there existed a leak somewhere in the official court machinery. The matter will undoubtedly be called to the attention of Judge Nave this morning by the United States attorney.

SERIOUS CHARGE AGAINST RECENT ARRIVAL IN CITY

Physician Who Came Here From California Arrested on Charge of Forgery.

Dr. Sanders, who came here about six weeks ago from California and who was recently selected as railroad surgeon for the Gila Valley railroad, was arrested Saturday night on a telegram from the sheriff of Los Angeles county, stating that the doctor was wanted in Los Angeles for forgery. He was arrested and locked up in the county jail.

MINE OPEATORS ISSUE ULTIMATUM TO MINERS' UNION

Contains New Wage Scale With Sweeping Reduction, Lowering Scale 20 Per Cent.

AND MINERS MUST SEVER CONNECTION WITH W. F. M.

Officials of Union Say It's a Bluff; There Will Be No Violence, Say Union Officers, and There Has Been None.

MINE OPEATORS ISSUE ULTIMATUM TO MINERS' UNION

GOLDFIELD, Nev., December 9.—Late this afternoon the Goldfield Mine Owners association issued an ultimatum to the miners in Goldfield, in the shape of a set of resolutions adopted at a meeting which had been in progress all day. The resolutions, which embody a new scale of wages, showing a lowering of the scale of about twenty per cent, are as follows:

Resolved that the mines of the district re-open upon the wage scale agreed upon and that the following rates of wages be adopted as the scale to be paid in the district, by all operators, members of the association:

Must Quit Union. Resolved, that no member of the association employ in or around any mine or mill, any member of Goldfield Local Union No. 229, Western Federation of Miners, or any union connected with the Western Federation; that all men hereafter employed by any member of this association in or around any mine or mill, be required as a condition to employment, to sign a written contract, which contains an agreement that the miner is not and will not be during the time he is working a member of Goldfield Miners' union, or any other union connected with the Western Federation.

REDUCE COST OF LIVING

Resolved, that it is the sense of the association that the cost of living in Goldfield district be reduced at least twenty per cent from what it now is, and unless this be done within a reasonable time the association will construct and operate a general merchandise store, or stores and boarding houses that will guarantee to the employed in and around the mines or mills, a reduction to this or a greater amount.

WANT WORK MINE

The executive committee of the Miners' union has been in session nearly all day, but no statement has been issued in answer to the one sent out by the mine owners, the contents of which are the belief of the miners' union expressed tonight after the issuance of the owners' statement, that no attempt will be made by the owners to do more than clear the mines of water that has accumulated during the present week.

MAY BE SETTLED

Conservative men not connected with either the owners' or miners' organizations are of the opinion that a settlement may yet be effected, and that if not an attempt will be made to organize a new union to be affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, with which the mine owners have already indicated they would be willing to enter an agreement.

REPORTS OF ATTEMPTS AT INTIMIDATION

Reports of attempts at intimidation, threats of violence and even attempts at violence are being constantly heard tonight, but at the union headquarters these are characterized as fakes and in instances were personal encounters have occurred the evidence is that the disturbances were caused by irresponsible parties and that the union officials are endeavoring to prevent disorder and violence.

WESLEY BURGESS RECEIVES MAXIMUM FOR SECOND DEGREE MURDER

Notwithstanding the recommendation of the jury for mercy, Judge Nave yesterday morning sentenced Wesley Burgess to life imprisonment in the territorial prison. Burgess was convicted by the jury for murder in the second degree and his sentence is the maximum for that crime.

VISITED GLOBE IN EARLY DAYS

Major Fred Mueller, receiver of the United States land office at Santa Fe, N. M., arrived in the city Sunday evening accompanied by J. Howard Vaughn, cashier of the First National bank of Santa Fe and also territorial treasurer of New Mexico.

STOCKHOLDERS MADE DEFENDANTS IN RECEIVERSHIP PROCEEDINGS; WILL FIGHT THE APPOINTMENT; BONDS ARE REDUCED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., December 9.—Attorney General Webb today commenced proceedings in the superior court for appointment of a receiver for the suspended California Safe Deposit and Trust company, whose president, vice president and general manager are charged with embezzlement. The stockholders as well as the officials and directors are made defendants and Judge Coffey issued temporary restraining orders preventing the officials and directors from disposing of the bank's assets in any way, pending the hearing for the appointment of a receiver.

BATTLESHIPS GATHER FOR BEGINNING OF TRIP TO THE PACIFIC

OLD POINT COMFORT, Va., December 9.—The double started flag of blue, the emblem of the commander in chief of the Pacific bound fleet, was flung to the breeze on the main truck of the battleship Connecticut today and Rear Admiral Evans formally assumed his position as leader, in the greatest naval movement in the history of the American people. This was assembly day for the fleet, which is to sail Monday, and of the sixteen great fighting machines ordered to skirt the southern end of America and inaugurate a new naval era for the Pacific ocean, there were 100 two laggards. These were the 16,000-ton Minnesota, the flagship of Rear Admiral Thomas, commander of the second squadron, and the Kentucky, whose 11,500 tons relegated her to a position at the end of the armored column.

Was Sitting on End of Pier With Niece When Huge Breaker Washed Him Into the Water.

did not bring the news of the death of John Bay of Globe, the most popular railroad man and a pioneer engineer of the Gila Valley and Globe & Northern. Yesterday forenoon Master Mechanic Dave Reed of the railroad received a telegram from Mrs. Bay, stating that her husband had been drowned, but giving no details of the accident.

The terrible news was a sad blow to the many friends of Mr. Bay in this city. He came to Globe almost seven years ago and was since that time continuously employed on the Gila Valley road. A little over two weeks ago he was granted a thirty days' vacation, the first he had ever asked for since his employment by the local road, and he left for Santa Cruz to join his wife and two little daughters, who had been spending several months with relatives. He left Globe with the crowd of vacation and with many happy anticipations. John E. Bay was about forty-seven years of age and since early manhood had followed railroading. He was employed as a locomotive engineer by the Gila Valley road and was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.
