WHITE SOX MAY PLAY GAME WITH GLOBE BALL TEAM

Randolph Line Representative Gives Guarantee for Game With the Ex-Champs.

Globe, through Lee Landis, representative of the Randolph lines in that place, has come to the front with an offer of a \$250 guarantee for one game to be played between the Chicago White Sox and a team from that town, says the Tucson Star. This offer was made in a communication received recently by E. G. Humphrey from Mr. Landis.

Some time ago, it will be remembered Mr. Humphrey received a telegram from Southern Pacific officials in San Francisco saying that the White Sox while on their return journey to Chicago after the spring practice in California were desirous of playing several games in Arizona with local teams, a guarantee of \$250 a game being called for.

The matter was given publicity through the press, and Globe was the first town to come forward with the required guarantee and a request to be placed on the list. The Globe fans realize that their team is not in the class with the Chicagoans, but they are willing to be led to the slaughter in order that the lovers of baseball in the town may have the pleasure of witnessing a team in action that once held the world's championship.
