

WILLIAM H. TAFT IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES

INDICATIONS AT LATE HOUR THIS MORNING ARE THAT REPUBLICANS HAVE WON BY GREAT LANDSLIDE

THREAT OF PANIC WAS STRONG ARGUMENT

All Factors Depended Upon to Work for Democratic Success Fail at Eleventh Hour When Victory Seemed Certain.

NEW YORK, November 3.—The indications point to 202,000 majority for Taft in New York state, against 175,000 for Roosevelt.

Hisgen, the independence party candidate, received about 28,000 votes in Greater New York.

The indications are that democratic governors were elected in several middle western states, which have given their votes to Taft.

Taft exceeded Roosevelt's plurality in New Jersey and in Massachusetts, as well as in New York.

The republican plurality fell off heavily in the middle west in a manner thoroughly surprising to the republican managers.

Cannon Re-elected. Speaker Cannon has been re-elected by his usual majority.

Representative Payne, of New York, and Representative Dalzell, of Pennsylvania, have been re-elected and the house of representatives will probably continue under the old regime.

Payne will have charge of the new tariff bill in the extra session which will call immediately after March 1, next.

Missouri returned to the "solid south" on the presidential ticket and is elected Cowherd as its governor.

TAFT ELECTED AT 7 P. M. NEW YORK, November 3.—Upon the returns received up to 7 o'clock, State Chairman Woodruff estimates the plurality of Taft in New York state at not less than 150,000. He claims that Hughes will receive 40,000 plurality in the state.

The estimates of Bryan's plurality in New York is 50,000.

At 7:15 p. m., Hitchcock said to the Associated Press:

"I stand on my claim of 325 electoral votes for Taft. I expect that Taft will receive not less than 100,000 plurality in New York state and that Governor Hughes will be re-elected."

The New York Times, New York World, New York Herald and Brooklyn Eagle announce the election of Taft.

MASSACHUSETTS, TAFT; 100,000. BOSTON, Mass., November 3.—The Globe (democratic) announces that Taft carried Massachusetts by 100,000, and Draper has been elected by 75,000.

CONNECTICUT IS REPUBLICAN. NEW HAVEN, Conn., November 3.—Taft's plurality in Connecticut will exceed 25,000. Lilley, the republican governor, will have over 15,000 plurality over Robertson, democrat. The republican will carry the complete state ticket and hold their usual majority in the legislature. All five of the republican congressmen were re-elected.

BRYAN CARRIES GEORGIA. SAVANNAH, Ga., November 3.—Bryan has carried Georgia, but the Taft and Watson vote was larger than generally expected.

REPUBLICANS HOLD NEW JERSEY. NEWARK, N. J., November 3.—The republican state committee claims the state for Taft by a large majority.

CANNON RE-ELECTED. DANVILLE, Ill., November 3.—Cannon has been re-elected by a majority of 6,000 to 7,000 over his democratic opponent, Henry C. Bell.

SOUTH CAROLINA, BRYAN; 60,000. COLUMBIA, S. C., November 3.—South Carolina will give Bryan 60,000 majority, while the state and congressional tickets are overwhelmingly democratic.

BRYAN SWEEP LOUISIANA. NEW ORLEANS, La., November 3.—Bryan swept Louisiana today. Returns indicate a majority of 40,000. All seven of the democratic nominees for congress were elected.

TAFT CARRIES DENVER. CHICAGO, November 3.—The indications now are that Taft has carried the state of Illinois by 170,000. Deneen, republican, for governor, has been elected by about 100,000.

USUAL THING IN FLORIDA.

JACKSONVILLE, November 3.—The election in Florida has resulted in the usual democratic majority of from 18,000 to 20,000.

SAME OLD THING IN TENNESSEE.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., November 3.—Incomplete returns indicate that Bryan carried the state by the usual democratic majority.

DUFONT CLAIMS DELAWARE.

WILMINGTON, Del., November 3.—General Du Pont, the republican state chairman, claims Delaware for Taft by 3,500 plurality. Also the election of Penwell, republican, for governor, by 2,000, and the remainder of the republican state ticket.

NORTH CAROLINA SAFE.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., November 3.—The complete democratic ticket was elected by about 30,000. The republican ticket made gains.

KANSAS FOR TAFT.

TOPEKA, Kan., November 3.—Taft will carry Kansas by 20,000.

BRYAN OVERTURNS NEBRASKA.

LINCOLN, Neb., November 3.—Bryan has overturned the normal republican plurality of 1600. Estimates show that Taft will not carry the city by more than 200 plurality. Bryan will carry his own precinct 106 to 52.

CALIFORNIA STILL REPUBLICAN.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., November 3.—Twenty-three precincts in Los Angeles out of 350—Taft, 597, Bryan 513. For congress—McLachlan 158, Rush 196.

Ten precincts out of 77 in Santa Clara county, Taft, 1097; Bryan 867; Hisgen 13; Chafin 116; Debs 23; Melvin 140; Murasky 920.

For congress—Hayes 1639; Tracy, 911.

The same precincts gave Roosevelt 1848; Parker 683.

In Santa Clara county, fifteen precincts out of 77 give Taft 2692; Bryan 1270; Hisgen 23; Chafin 216; Debs 374. The same precincts in 1904 gave Roosevelt 2827; Parker 9932.

San Francisco—Scattering returns from four precincts, with 308 votes counted, give Taft 150; Bryan 136; Debs, 23; Melvin 134; Murasky 143.

For congress—Fourth district, Maguire 133; Kahn 143.

Eleven scattering precincts in San Francisco gave Taft 209; Bryan 194; Debs 58; Melvin 62; Murasky 240.

Out of 271 votes counted in two precincts in San Francisco, Taft 134; Bryan 118; Melvin 130; Murasky 121.

Sacramento—The city, complete, returns Taft 4407; Bryan 3135. The republican candidates for the legislature were elected.

DEMOCRATS WIN DAKOTA.

North Dakota—Republicans concede election of Burke, democrat, for governor, over Johnson, republican. The balance of the ticket, including both congressmen, is carried by a good majority.

VERMONT'S MAJORITY.

Vermont—Complete returns for the state of Vermont give Taft 39,592; Bryan, 11,688.

UTAH, REPUBLICAN; 25,000.

SALT LAKE, Utah, November 3.—Republican Chairman Loop claims that Utah is republican by 25,000. He claims every county.

CHICAGO, TAFT; 50,000.

Chicago—1144 out of 1260 precincts in Chicago give Taft 180,976; Bryan, 128,123. In 592 out of 2611 precincts in Illinois, outside of Cook county, Taft 94,095; Bryan 60,466.

Detroit—Sixty-three out of 2103 precincts and wards give Taft 31,470; Bryan 20,860. Warner for governor, republican, 15986.

Missouri—Four precincts out of 26 in Vernon county give Taft 201; Bryan 248.

St. Paul—Returns from Minneapolis show that Johnson is leading Jacobson in the race for Governor, equal with Taft.

Milwaukee—237 precincts in Wisconsin, including 120 in Milwaukee county, give Bryan 29,918; Taft, 35,044.

OKLAHOMA DEMOCRATIC.

OKLAHOMA CITY, November 3.—The Oklahoma Democrat, at 9 p. m., says that the state is for Bryan by 25,000; that the legislature will be 90 per cent democratic, with four democratic congressmen and one republican elected.

GILA COUNTY REMAINS LOYAL TO DEMOCRACY

ALL DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES BUT ONE OR TWO FOR UNIMPORTANT OFFICES ELECTED

FIGHT WAS BITTER AND HARD FOR SOME OF THE NOMINEES, BUT PRACTICALLY ALL OF THEM ARE VICTORIOUS—MARCUS A. SMITH IS GIVEN HANDSOME PLURALITY IN SPITE OF STRENUOUS EFFORTS OF OPPOSITION—J. H. THOMPSON WINS.

Unofficial returns from all precincts in Gila county, save six, indicate the election of the entire democratic county ticket, save Nymyer, candidate for superintendent of schools. The most important box out is that in Globe precinct No. 1, which may change results in one or two instances. It was announced this morning at 4 o'clock that the count would not be completed until noon today. The republican candidates, shortly after midnight, practically admitted defeat. An unexpectedly heavy vote was cast for Cameron and the returns received up to 4 o'clock indicate that Smith will not have a plurality in the county of more than 150. Walter Shute, candidate for district attorney, will undoubtedly lead the democratic ticket, and W. O. Kellner, candidate for county superintendent of schools, will lead the republican ticket. Henry Thompson, democratic candidate for sheriff, on the face of the latest returns, will have a plurality of something like 200. Robert Pinyan will probably have a plurality of 110. There is a neck and neck race on between Ryan and Miles for county supervisor, but the final count will perhaps show Miles in the lead by at least 100 votes. Trevillian will receive a heavy vote in the Globe box, but not sufficient to offer him any encouragement. WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN GIVES OUT NO STATEMENT

Defeated Democratic Nominee Makes No Attempt to Conceal Chagrin, But Will Not Discuss Election

FAIRVIEW, Lincoln, Neb., November 3.—The luncheon of his home turned into a temporary telegraph and newspaper office, W. J. Bryan watched the returns tonight with manifest interest. He was, however, perhaps the most unconscious among those who had assembled to hear the verdict.

Bryan divided his time between his parlor and the library, where he received special reports from the state chairman and the national committee, and frequently came upstairs and read aloud the reports received. The returns from New York, particularly from the up-state precincts, were of more than usual interest to the candidate, when he declared that the democratic increase over the vote of 1904 was about what had been expected. He made many inquiries regarding the result in Greater New York and Ohio.

Bryan received tonight at his home, Fairview, the returns which early told him that for the third time he had been defeated in the greatest ambition of his life. Confident of victory to the very last, he was not prepared to believe his cause lost until the pluralities of his republican opponent piled up in such proportions as to leave no room for doubt.

When early returns came in, he made no special inquiries regarding the state of New York and found much encouragement in the gains he was making up state over the democratic vote of 1904, but, as the figures continued to be received, he relied on Greater New York to offset the heavy Taft vote above the Harlem river. Even in that, he was bitterly disappointed, and he soon realized that the state was hopelessly gone and with it his prospects of being elected.

According to the predictions of his managers, he was led to believe that he would be elected without the aid of the Empire state and turned his inquiries toward Ohio and Indiana. A heavy democratic gain in the thirteenth Ohio district was a source of satisfaction and then indicated that the prophecies that Ohio would go democratic would be fulfilled. He also derived much comfort from a telegram from John E. Lamb, a member of the advisory committee from Indiana, stating that the indications were that Indiana was democratic from the fact that his own precinct had given him a handsome majority, and, in the reports, that he again would carry his own state.

After nearly three hours spent in his library, Mr. Bryan went upstairs and (Continued on Page Four)

ROOSEVELT FEASTS WITH CABINET WHILE RETURNS ARE SERVED HOT

WASHINGTON, November 3.—The president and Mrs. Roosevelt reached the White House on their return from Oyster Bay shortly before 6:30 o'clock this evening.

The first thing the president did when he reached home was to scan the latest election returns which, by the time he arrived at the White House, were coming in rapidly. He was especially pleased to read the report of his home district in Oyster Bay, which gave both Taft and Hughes majorities. At the White House executive offices, direct wires of the different telegraph companies and of the Associated Press were installed, and had the news at the earliest possible moment.

Graham County is Safe for Hon. Mark A. Smith

SAFFORD, November 4.—1:30 a. m. Returns from all voting precincts in Graham county, save Morenci, give Smith 1134 and Cameron 841. The vote in the Morenci precinct is about a standoff, which gives the county to Smith by a majority of 293. In the Safford precinct, the total vote was: Smith 187; Cameron 112.

Hampton, democrat, is elected territorial councilman by a good majority and Pace and Merrill, democrats, will represent the county in the territorial assembly. They will have majorities exceeding 300. The other democratic candidates elected were: Bunch, probate judge; McAllister, district attorney; Williams, treasurer; Claridge, recorder; Cobb, surveyor; Woods, superintendent of schools; supervisors, Webster and Dowdle; justice of the peace, Safford, Colton; constable, same precinct, McGonigle. Latest returns indicate that Anderson, republican, has been re-elected sheriff.
