DRIFTS ON RAFT WITH DEAD.

Sole Survivor of Wreck Is Picked Up By Belgians.

MOBILE, Ala., November 3.—A message received here today by the collector of the port states that the Belgian steamer Tiflis arrived at Port Arthur, Texas, today and reports picking up at sea a raft having on board Alexander Sjolm, the sole survivor of the crew of the American schooner Beulah McCabe. Sjolm reported that his companions had died from exhaustion and starvation.

The raft was picked up 200 miles southwest of the Bahamas. Sjolm reported that the McCabe encountered a hurricane and foundered, and everything and every soul on board went down with the exception of himself and the dead men.

RUBBER TIRES SAVES HIS LIFE.

Insulate Buggy When Horse Is Shocked to Death.

TRENTON, N. J., November 3.—A live wire dangling loose from its fastenings caused the death of a horse attached to the cab of William Ranbio, but the rubber tires of the vehicle saved the life of the man. The horse came in contact with the wire and dropped dead in its tracks.

As the wire lay over the horse, the man did not jump out onto the wet pavement, where he might have gotten a shock. Secure in insulation from the rubber wheels, he stayed in the vehicle until a trolley car came along and the electrician sent to mend the break took the wire away from the dead horse.

TRAVELS FAR TO CAST VOTE.

Baltimorean Comes From Rome to Help Elect Brother to Congress.

BALTIMORE, November 3.—The most expensive vote cast in Baltimore was that of John W. Garrett, secretary of the American legation in Rome, who came to exercise his right of franchise in favor of his brother, Robert Barrett, who wants to go to congress in place of J. F. C. Talbot.

TWO KILLED IN "BEAR TRAP"

Cave-in at Government Dam at Wheeling Crushes Workmen.

WHEELING, W. Va., November 3.—The false work of the "bear trap" at Government Dam No. 13 on the Ohio river, at McMechin, a suburb, gave way this afternoon and Martin Supert and Frank Walling were buried under twenty-five feet of gravel. Twenty men had left the pit only ten minutes before, otherwise they would have been killed. The bodies of the two killed were horribly crushed. The loss to the government contractors will be large.

BUILDING MORE TORPEDO BOATS

WASHINGTON, November 3.—Bids were opened at the navy department for the construction of eight new submarine torpedo boats for which congress has appropriated \$3,500,000. There were three bidders, The Electric Boat company of Quincy, Mass.; the Lake Torpedo Boat company, Bath Maine; and the American Laurenti company of Philadelphia.

The Electric Boat company bid for both boats of 435 tons displacement from \$414,000 to \$444,000 according to the class and number of boats built on the Atlantic coast. For constructing the same boats on the Pacific coast, their prices range from \$446,000 to \$61,000.

MAN USES AX TO MURDER.

Kills Brother-in-Law, Attacks Wife and Hangs Self.

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., November 3.—William Bales, 35, went to the home of his brother-in-law, Burney Bayless, here, and without a word of warning, split Bayless' head open with an ax, killing him instantly. He then turned on his own wife, who was visiting at the Bayless home, and brained her with the same instrument.

Bales was arrested and hurried to jail. To control him it was necessary to tie him with a rope, and with this rope he hanged himself in his cell and was dead when discovered.

The cause of the tragedy was jealousy of Bales, some unknown cause on the part of Bales. He and Bayless married sisters. Mrs. Bales was still alive late tonight, but cannot recover.

TWELVE MORE DAYS AND THEN THE 16TH.

TAFT MAKES MERRY WITH FRIENDS AT HOME

CONGRATULATIONS BEGIN TO COME EARLY IN THE EVENING.

BROTHER CHARLEY HAD MADE ELABORATE PREPARATIONS FOR THE RETURNS.

Best of Telegraph Service Had Been Installed at Home of the Judge in Cincinnati, and Friends Were Invited to Hear the News.

CINCINNATI, November 3.—Up to 10 o'clock tonight, there has been no break in the optimistic character of the returns received at the Taft residence, in this city, where Taft, the republican candidate, and Mrs. Taft are surrounded by a merry party of close friends. At that time Taft had no doubt of his election, as indicated by congratulatory telegrams sent to Chairman Hitchcock shortly after 9 o'clock, central time.

Judge Taft declined to make any statement. Elaborate preparations had been made by C. P. Taft, and the best telegraph preparations were made.

The first news the judge received over the long distance telephone was from Judge Fisher, from Jamestown, N. Y., to the effect that Jamestown had given Taft 2900 majority.

Governor Hughes wired Taft at 9:30: "Heartiest congratulations on your splendid victory."

Judge Taft began after 10 o'clock answering telegrams and congratulations.

"It is delightful to think of such support from the old Bay state," he sent to Massachusetts.

To Governor Hughes, Judge Taft wired: "I thank you warmly for your congratulations and reciprocate by extending congratulations to you on carrying New York state against tremendous odds, and the wonderful campaign which you have carried on. We are all indebted to you, also, for your aid in the national campaign."

FIREMAN SHOT IN CAB.

RENO, Nev., November 3.—John Middaugh, a fireman, running on the Southern Pacific, was mysteriously shot last night while running between here and Sparks. The bullet ploughed through his shoulder and into the lung. He fell unconscious to the floor of the cab, while Engineer Christensen rushed full speed to Sparks. Middaugh's condition is critical.

CHINESE BOYCOTT SUPPRESSED.

HONG KONG, November 3.—The rioting that resulted, yesterday, from an attempt of those involved, to force local merchants to continue the boycott against Japanese goods has suppressed by the soldiers, who were called out to patrol the business districts. One Chinese who offered armed resistance was shot. The riots were organized primarily by students of this city and the disturbance is evidently wide spread.

FIGHTING EXTRADITION

WASHINGTON, November 3.—Solicitor General Hoyt presented in the supreme court of the United States a motion to advance the cases of Flores Magon, Antonio Villaroel and Librado Rivera, who are held in custody by Los Angeles officials on a charge of having incited a filibustering military expedition from Arizona against the republic of Mexico.

They sought relief through a writ of habeas corpus to avoid extradition from California to Arizona, but, failing in the effort in the federal circuit court, appealed to the supreme court, which took the motion under advisement.

RUEF ATTORNEYS DISAGREE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—Characterizing the attempt to fill the jury box in the usual way as "hopeless" attorney Ach, head of the Ruef defense, offered the suggestion today that the jury be secured by agreement of counsel on two men to fill the vacant places in the box.

Attorney Heney promised to consider the suggestion and let Ach know in the near future. Nineteen talesmen were examined today without result.

PASTOR REFUSES \$3,000

Raise of That Amount in His Salary Kindly Declined.

PITTSBURGH, November 3.—The unusual spectacle of a pastor refusing a raise of \$3,000 a year in salary was witnessed here tonight. The Rev. S. Edward Young, pastor of the Second Presbyterian church of Pittsburgh, had received a call to the Bedford Avenue Presbyterian church of Brooklyn.

His salary here has been \$7,000 a year; but his congregation tonight voted to increase this to \$10,000 if he would but stay in Pittsburgh. Told of this, the Rev. Mr. Young, who came here from Newark, N. J., eleven years ago, said:

"I will certainly stay with my people if they feel that they need me so badly; but I will not take one cent of the raise in salary offered."

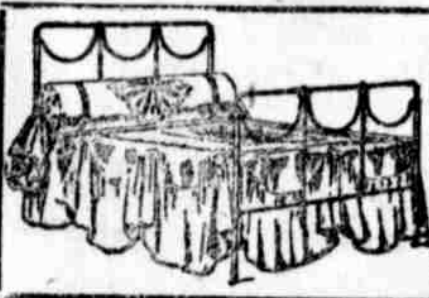

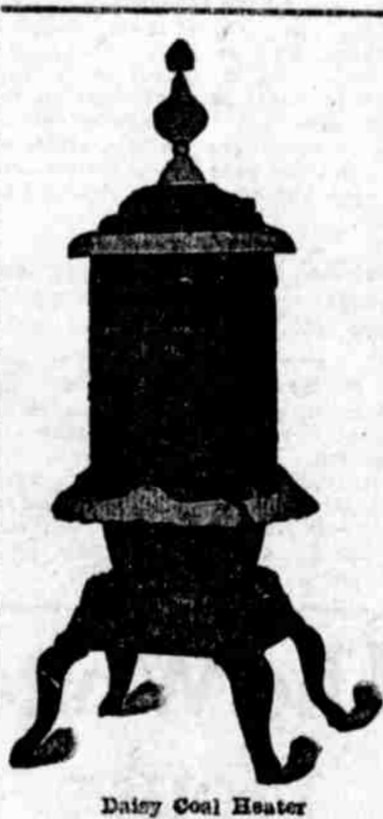

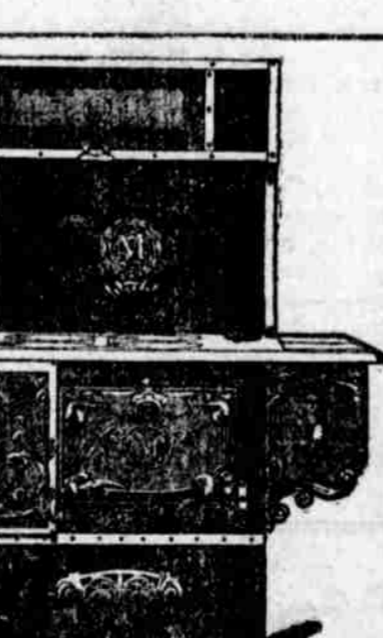
