

GILA COUNTY ELECTS 9 DEMOCRATIC OFFICERS

FOUR REPUBLICANS--KELLNER, WILLIAMSON, RYAN AND PRATT RETURNED WINNERS

FINAL COUNT FURNISHES MANY SURPRISES AND MAKES SEVERAL CHANGES FROM FIGURES GIVEN OUT YESTERDAY MORNING--WILLIAMSON AND RYAN GET SMALL MAJORITIES, BUT LAND AHEAD OF PINYAN AND MILES, THOUGHT SURE WINNERS.

The later count of the ballots of Globe precinct No. 1 yesterday afternoon presented many surprises and changed the aspect of the situation in several essential details. The early count in the city and election night returns from outlying precincts indicated the election of Pinyan for treasurer and Miles for supervisor, both democratic, but as the count in Globe precinct No. 1 proceeded, their pluralities gradually dwindled away and finally disappeared until their republican opponents, Williamson and Ryan, respectively, came out with scant pluralities to the good. Up to late last night, returns had been received in full from all precincts in the county but five and are contained in the table published this morning. The belated precincts are Pine, Pleasant Valley, Rice, Winkelman and Christman, and local handicappers aver that these precincts normally return in the aggregate a fair democratic majority. At any rate it would be scarcely possible for the returns from these precincts to make any change in the general result. Therefore the list of "public servants" published at the head of this column is undoubtedly correct. The returns as given from Pine are incomplete, the vote for several of the different offices having been omitted. The biggest surprise of the day was in the way Williamson began to climb up in the last thousand of the count of scratched tickets in the city. While Williamson came into the city with a plurality of 28 over Pinyan, the count in Globe precinct No. 1 up to 4 o'clock yesterday morning, gave Pinyan a plurality of 73, which put him in the lead by 45 votes. But about that time the tide turned and in the last seven hundred votes counted Williamson climbed and climbed until at the completion of the count he stood elected treasurer of

INDICATIONS ARE THAT TAFT WILL HAVE 409 VOTES IN COLLEGE.

COLORADO FOR BRYAN

INDIANA, WEST VIRGINIA AND MONTANA ARE ALL SAFELY REPUBLICAN.

NEW YORK, November 4.--Returns received up to a late hour tonight indicate that Taft will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college. This is within sixteen votes of the forecast made by Hitecock, and sixty-seven more than a majority of the total electoral vote of 483.

If Missouri votes for Taft, the total may reach 327. News of late returns indicate that Maryland, after vacillating during the day and apparently being safe for the democrats, has been swung into the Taft column. Unofficial figures give Taft the state by 136 votes. Indiana and West Virginia, as well as Montana, turned out to be safely republican.

Colorado is for Bryan. If Missouri, which late developments place in the doubtful column, goes for Bryan, he will have a total of 174, two less than he received in 1896. In 1904, Parker received only 140 votes, in 1900 Bryan received 155 votes and in 1896 he got 178 votes.

Temporary Defeat But Not Conquered Says S. Gompers

WASHINGTON, November 4.--"Temporarily defeated, but not conquered," is the way President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, viewed the election in a statement issued today. "The organized workers stood true to the cause of justice and human freedom," says Gompers. "This is not the first time in the struggles between the masses and entrenched wealth, that privilege and power have gained a material, even though temporary victory. The moral influence of the campaign is with the workers. The part that labor took, compelled discussion to be devoted almost exclusively to the labor question, the labor movement and the principles of right, justice and humanity upon which their philosophy and demands are based. Even though disappointed with the result, there is no loss of faith or confidence in the justice of labor's demands, and their successful achievement by action, consistent, insistent and persistent, will assist for the toilers, the triumph of the cause of labor and the cause of human justice."

CONCEDE NEBRASKA. OMAHA, Neb., November 4.--The Republican concedes the state to Bryan by 5,000 or more; the election of Shallenger by 8,000, and says that surface indications point to a clean sweep of Nebraska in the congressional delegation by democrats, although the fourth district is still in doubt. The legislature will be democratic, but there is no senator to elect.

JURY DELIBERATES FATE OF MORSE AND CURTIS

CHARGED WITH FRAUD RELATIVE TO SUSPENSION OF BANK OF NORTH AMERICA. Still Waiting For Verdict at Late Hour Last Night--Case Has Attracted Wide Attention by Reason of Prominence of Bank and Defendants.

NEW YORK, November 4.--The case of Charles W. Morse and Alfred H. Curtis, jointly indicted and on trial in the United States court here for violation of the banking laws in connection with the suspension of the National Bank of North America, were given to the jury today and the fate of the two defendants was still undecided late tonight.

MARK A. SMITH BEATEN BY RALPH CAMERON--636

DEFEAT OF VETERAN TERRITORIAL DELEGATE CONCEDED EARLY IN AFTERNOON AT PHOENIX

CANDIDATES TIE VOTE IN PIMA AND NAVAJO COUNTIES AND SMITH CARRIES SIX OF THE OTHERS, BUT MAJORITIES GIVEN CAMERON IN REMAINING FIVE ARE TOO GREAT TO BE OVERCOME--SENSATION ON STREET CAUSED BY EARLY EXTRA.

BEGINNING OF RAILROAD TO MIAMI

Construction work on the Miami extension of the Gila Valley, Globe & Northern will begin at once.

J. C. McClure, superintendent of construction for the Rando'ph lines, and P. Jones, superintendent of bridges and buildings, arrived in the city last night to begin their end of the work.

E. F. Godso has resigned as roadmaster for the Gila Valley, Globe & Northern, to accept a position on the construction of the new road, which, it is said, will be construction "to Miami and north," and his place on the Gila Valley has already been filled by the appointment of William Conner as roadmaster.

Two or three surveys for the new road have already been made, the right of way has been secured, and everything is ready for a speedy construction of the road that will bring Globe in direct touch with the rich country to the north and west and increase the trade of the local stores by all the business to be developed through the working of the Miami mines.

Roosevelt Gives Interpretation of the Election

WASHINGTON, November 4.--President Roosevelt today gave his interpretation of the victory of the republican party, when he said to the newspaper men whom he received in his office: "This administration has meant a steady effort and progress which should never be allowed to deviate into unwise radicalism on the one hand, nor into unwise conservatism on the other hand. "The nomination of Taft was a triumph over a reactionary conservatism, and the election was a triumph over an unwise and improper radicalism."

Mark A. Smith was defeated for territorial delegate by Ralph Cameron. According to advices received by the Silver Belt late last night, Cameron is elected by a majority of 636 votes. This is, however, altogether unofficial, a dispatch from the St. John's Herald stating that complete returns of Apache county give Cameron a majority of 166, while advices from other sources cut down his majority to 75.

The counties carried by Smith are Gila, Mohave, Graham, Pinal, Yuma and Santa Cruz. Cameron carried Apache, Yavapai, Coconino, Maricopa and Cochise. In Pima and Navajo counties, the candidates tied.

While the official count will be necessary to indicate the actual figures, there is no room to doubt the defeat of Mark Smith by a majority so large that it cannot be overcome.

In Gila county, where Tuesday night, Mark Smith was believed to have a majority, the figures were pulled down as the count proceeded until when the last ballot in the box of Globe precinct No. 1 had been counted, this majority had been cut down to 39, and advices from Winkelman, received by telephone, announced that it would be made 38. Four other boxes are to be heard from, but these will make no material change in the vote for Cameron and Smith.

DEMOCRACY MORE CLOSELY UNITED THAN EVER

NEW YORK, November 4.--Declaring the democratic party to be more united today than it has been for many years and that Bryan was defeated by what he claims was misrepresentation to the effect that his election would have hurt business interests, Chairman Mack of the democratic national committee this afternoon, issued a statement in which he announces extensive plans to advance the party's interest during the next four years. Mack's statement follows:

"There is not much for me to say, and I have no apologies to make relative to the victory of the republican party. Bryan made the most magnificent fight ever waged by any candidate. This party was made the victim of misrepresentation, misrepresentation to the effect that a democratic success would retard the business interests of the country. That was an argument without foundation. "Notwithstanding yesterday's defeat, the democratic party stands more united today than it has for many years and in this union lies future strength and power for recuperation."

"It is my intention to continue the headquarters in Buffalo and Washington for the next four years, to keep in touch with leaders in all states, and to promulgate democratic principles and democratic thought by printing literature to aid the leaders of the party
