DIAZ FLEES CAPITAL FOR VERA CRUZ, GOING BY WAY OF LITTLE USED RAILROAD

Fearing He Would Never be Able to Get Out of Capital Alive Aged Dictator Secretly Slips Away in Darkness of Night in Hope of Reaching Refuge in Spain; Like Fugitive From Justice He Hurries Away in Auto Through Dark Streets to Narrow Gauge Railroad in Effort to Elude Insurrectos Watching For Him on Main Road.

JUAREZ, May 26.—A message to Francisco I. Madero late tonight from Senor Cordan at Jalapa, Mexico, stated that the train bearing President Diaz to Vera Cruz has been attacked at Tepehuaco. No details are given. Previous reports stated that the train was not attacked.

MEXICO CITY, May 26.—Private telegrams received tonight report the arrival of Diaz at Vera Cruz at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

According to these advices Diaz boarded the Ypiranga, a Hamburg-American boat, tonight. The Ypiranga is due to sail to the south coast tomorrow. She will return to Vera Cruz and sail for Europe Wednesday.

Railroad reports received say the pilot train was stopped by insurrectos below Jalapa, but after learning it was serving as a pilot to the Diaz train it was permitted to proceed. None of the three trains suffered other delays.

The End of Diaz. MEXICO CITY, May 26.—Porfirio Diaz, to whom during 30 years all Mexico paid allegiance, secretly left the capital at 2 o'clock this morning.

In the distance he could hear the voices of enthusiastic celebrators who were acclaiming a new president, Francisco Leon de la Barra, and shouting "Viva Madero."

Travel between here and the seaport is usually over the Mexican Railway standard gauge line, with modern equipment. The rails along the route, however, have frequently been removed of late by bandits who desire to reach Vera Cruz without the fact being known to marauding bands along the route.

Thought Him a Thief. They are reported to have harbored the idea that Diaz would follow the precedent of other Latin American presidents and carry the national funds with him.

There is another railroad to the coast, a narrow gauge affair, owned by the government. Taking it for granted that Diaz would take the more luxurious train, the bandits did not molest it for this reason the narrow gauge was chosen by the former president for the trip.

The general reached Vera Cruz this afternoon, according to word received here tonight. Presumably he is Barra and the higher governmental officials have been informed, but their lips are sealed.

Diaz was feeble from illness when he left home. A more dreary leaving could scarcely be imagined. Rain had fallen earlier in the night and by the time he emerged from the house the air was chilly. He was closely muffled and to aid in his disguise borrowed an auto and used the route to the San Lazaro station, which had been mapped out over unfrequented streets.

By a prearranged plan, at the last moment, the police scattered along the line. At certain points close friends of the former chief executive, including those to accompany him across the Atlantic, fell in behind his insouciance.

Three Trains Used. Three trains were used, the first acting as pilot. The Diaz special followed and some time later a third train, followed by a detachment of the Twenty-fifth infantry, set out.

MADERO A PRIVATE CITIZEN; LAYS DOWN ALL AUTHORITY IN MEXICO; TO SPEAK IN EL PASO

JUAREZ, May 26.—Francisco I. Madero, Jr., in a manifesto to the people of Mexico tonight, resigned the position as provisional president conferred upon him by the convention of revolutionists at the city of San Luis Potosi last October, and called upon all Mexicans to support Senor de la Barra as the sole executive of Mexico.

Madero places his forces at the disposal of the new executive, pointing out that he may well be considered "one of us." The manifesto was Madero's last act as provisional president and he will now refer all inquiries of the insurrecto forces or the insurrecto civil authorities to Senor de la Barra.

Having relinquished the post which he believed would not permit him to enter American territory, he accepted tonight the invitation of the El Paso city officials to attend a public reception in his honor next Monday, following which he will probably leave for Mexico City to assist de la Barra as a private citizen in pacifying the country.

The inauguration of Senor de la Barra as provisional president was a very brief affair, occupying but ten minutes. To spectators it seemed that he had scarcely moved down Avenida Cinco de Mayo, with his escort, before he was on his way back to the national palace, his carriage smothered in flowers.

The oath was administered by the president of the chamber of deputies. The provisional president stood with his hand extended and repeated the oath. It is not the custom in Mexico to use the bible in taking the oath, nor is the name of the Deity used.

Madero's Resignation. JUAREZ, May 26.—In issuing his manifesto resigning from the provisional presidency of Mexico, Francisco I. Madero says: "Fellow Citizens: "When by the San Luis Potosi plan of last October I invited you to take up arms to recover our liberties and political rights, you all concurred to my call, and in six months, by your heroic efforts, you have overthrown the dictatorial regime which for 35 years has oppressed our fatherland."

Triumph Complete. "Our triumph has been complete and in succession will be justice equally for rich and poor, for the powerful and the humble. Liberty will spread its broad wings to all Mexicans and, united fraternally, we will all work for the aggrandisement of our country."

"Having continued the revolution until its conclusion it seemed that I should convolve the general elections, according to the stipulations of the San Luis Potosi plan, but the war of fratricide which we have been obliged to carry on did not triumph in the determination of personalities, but in the victory of our principles. From the moment we triumphed and we saw the republic surely coming under the regime of liberty, Diaz and Ramon Corral resolving to resign and to leave the power in the hands of Senor de la Barra; from that moment, I say, it appeared to me that I should act for the interests of the fatherland, putting a final stop to bloodshed and of the war of fratricide."

Election to Decide. "To those who for so many years have been victims of tyranny and who fear some trick from their old oppressors I say they should fear nothing. The people already have shown their omnipotence and before I resigned the provisional presidency I agreed with Senor de la Barra upon the necessity of all Mexicans being satisfied with any national aspirants which in the next general elections will respect the popular will."

General Madero believes that November 3d, the date suggested by the Mexican congress today, as the time for the general election, is altogether too remote. He sent a message tonight urging that a date early in September be chosen.

Cuellar as Governor. MEXICO CITY, May 26.—General Samuel Garcia Cuellar, chief of staff
