BITTER OPPOSITION SHOWN BY DRANGEMEN

Immense Demonstration in Opposition to Home Rule in Belfast
BELFAST, Ireland, April 9.—That the opposition of Ulster, on which the Irish unionists mainly base their hopes of ultimately defeating home rule, is as strong as in 1886 or 1892, the years in which Gladstone introduced his two home rule bills for Ireland, seems to have been fairly demonstrated by the vast throngs of Drangemen and unionists, who again registered today their unalterable and unshaken opposition to a parliament for Ireland in any form. A demonstration of 150,000 enthusiasts passed in procession before the unionist leaders this afternoon. After this the immense gathering adopted a resolution, refusing to accept home rule in any form, sang the national anthem, and dispersed.

GAYNOR CANDIDACY THOUGHT PROBABLE

New York Delegation May Be for the Home Product
NEW YORK, April 9.—With the return today of Charles F. Murphy, the leader of Tammany Hall, from Atlantic City, it was said that should the councils of party leaders be followed, as there is every reason to believe they will be, New York's likely delegates to the democratic national convention will go to Baltimore unpledged to any candidate. In addition to the four delegates at large to be chosen by the state convention which assembles here Thursday, 43 congressional districts will name delegates who will be confirmed by the state convention. It was announced today that no slate had been agreed on as to delegates at large although it was said the delegates will probably be Senator O'Govern, Murphy, Samuel Untermyer and Governor Dix, or Lieutenant Governor Thomas F. Conway. Other names suggested are Isador Straus and Alton B. Parker. It is predicted by leading democrats that in the speech of Mayor Gaynor at the National Democratic club dinner celebrating the birthday of Jefferson Saturday night there will be formal announcement of his candidacy for the presidency. It is said by close friends and leaders that the ninety delegates of New York, even though uncommitted, will vote for Gaynor.

RUEF STORY IS HELD UP FOR TIME BEING

Paper Announces Article is Likely to Make Enemies for Prisoner
SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.—The Bulletin, the afternoon newspaper which started to publish what is claimed to be "the inside history of the famous graft cases" in San Francisco, written by Abraham Ruef, now in San Quentin prison, today announced it would discontinue the publication of the stories until the indictments which are hanging over Ruef shall be dismissed. "Publication will be discontinued," it is announced, "until the remaining indictments, which remain as possible weapons for the enemies the story may make, are dismissed." The motion to dismiss is now before Judge Dunne, who stated it would be taken up "in due course of time."

NEW SUGAR TRUST HEAD

WICKERSHAM TO QUIT CABINET IN MARCH

Even If Taft Should Be Re-elected Attorney General's Resignation is in
WASHINGTON, April 9.—Attorney General Wickersham will not serve in the cabinet after March 4, even if Taft is re-elected, it was announced today. It was also stated that Wickersham and the president are in thorough accord over the policy of the administration regarding trust prosecutions, and today's announcement is without any political significance. "Every cabinet officer resigns at the end of the administration," said Wickersham, "and I expect to resign March 4 next. As to entering a future cabinet, I do not care to state what my action will be until a position is tendered me."

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Uncertainty again exists as to how many persons are implicated in the murder of W. H. Waite, the American manager of the Esmeraldas Mining company, at Ocotlán, Vera Cruz, this week. Reports to the state department say several laborers are involved. Consul Haskell, of Salina Cruz, will continue the investigation.
