**ARMY OF 1,950,000 FORECAST  
FOR 1946 -**

WASHINGTON (CNS)- An Army of 1,950,000 by June 30, 1946, 550,000 lower than the last previous estimate of the Army's size, was provided for in President Truman's proposed War Department appropriation. Congress will act on this recommendation. The President asked the legislative body to cut appropriations by \$28,000,000,000.

Two days later, Secretary of War Patterson, in his first news conference in that position, promised that even further cuts would be made "if future events permit." Of 8,300,000 in khaki on VE Day, 7,000,000 will be discharged by mid-1946, and another 320,000 would be in the pipeline from overseas to separation centers. This plan depends, on the continuance of the draft.
