### OF LOCAL INTEREST

**TO LEAVE PHOENIX.**—E. C. Summers, conductor of Arizona Aerie No. 178, Fraternal Order of Eagles, is to leave today for California. He will visit friends in Los Angeles and from there go to San Francisco.

**DR. FOWLER RETURNS.**—Dr. Henry Fowler, a member of the well known Philadelphia of this city, returned to Phoenix yesterday after an absence of four or five years. He is from Philadelphia and expects to remain in the city but a short time.

**A BICYCLE FOUND.**—The police were notified yesterday by the officials in charge of the government experimental farm west of the city that a bicycle had been found at the edge of the road near the farm. The police are endeavoring to locate the owner of the wheel.

**PREPARING FOR BUSINESS.**—Information from Kyrene is to the effect that the melon planters are rapidly preparing for business. The plows and other necessary farm implements are on the ground and the seed has arrived from Rocky Ford. It is proposed to plant 500 acres to canteloupes.

**THE GOULD RAILROAD.**—M. E. Philney, representing the Western Salt company arrived in Phoenix yesterday from San Diego. He says the Gould interests are gradually and quietly making large investments in and around San Diego and that they are the people behind the new railroad to be built from San Diego to Yuma.

**DEATH OF J. L. DOUGHERTY.**—Joseph L. Dougherty died last night at the Hardwick hotel after an illness of six months of cancer of the stomach. He had really been ill much longer than that, but it was about six months ago since it became known that he was a very sick man. For some time previous to that he had been in the Harqua Halas engaged in work on mining properties he owned there. When he returned to Phoenix he was so emaciated that his friends hardly recognized him. Mr. Dougherty had been living in and about Phoenix for nearly twenty-five years, and all the time had been engaged in the mining business. When Tombstone was in its prime he was there. He had followed mining throughout the west generally, and was at one time at Butte, Mont. He was about 60 years of age.

**THOROUGHBREED CATTLE.**—H. Renaud, who has a 200-acre farm southeast of Alhambra, has recently received a shipment of thoroughbred Holsteins, and he now lays claim to having the best breed of milkers in the territory. The consignment included two bulls and 16 cows. One of the bulls, Piebe Paul by name, No. 37-954, H. F. H. B., was bred by E. N. McGeech of Milwaukee. The animal is a yearling of the best blood. May Harting Pauline De Kool, a full sister of his, has an A. R. O. record of 29 pounds 4.2 ounces of butter in seven days. The second bull, Aggie Lad Calantha, was bred by W. B. Barney of Hampton, Iowa. The three nearest dams of his sire, Calanthas Fourth Ltd. No. 26,940, H. F. H. B., have an average butter record of 25.1 pounds in seven days, and an average milk record of 90.1 pounds, a yearly record of 13,356 pounds of milk and a yearly record of 589.6 pounds of butter fat. Oneeda, one of the cows in the herd, No. 48,810, H. F. H. B., a 2-year heifer, has a record of 80 pounds of milk a day. Agnes Wickfield Jewel, No. 51-142, H. F. H. B., another of the cows, has a record of seven gallons of milk per day. With the same shipment Mr. Renaud received two thoroughbred Poland-China sows, one Poland-China boar and one thoroughbred Scotch collie dog. Mr. Renaud, in conjunction with his farm, operates a creamery which has a separator with a capacity of 1,000 pounds per hour, and a butter machine of equivalent capacity. He is one of the most prosperous farmers in the valley, and in the future proposes to deal largely in high-bred cattle.

### STEALING WATER

**It is Announced That Action Is To Be Taken Against Offenders.**

Trouble is threatened for the persons who have been tampering with the water gates, leading from the canals and thus securing a flow of water for their ranches which they are not entitled to. It was stated on good authority yesterday that several arrests would probably be made this week, possibly today, and that the offenders would be given the full extent of punishment allowed by law.

Over a year ago the district court issued restraining orders enjoining numerous persons from interfering with the flow of water in the canals, but these restraining orders are said to have been broken by the offenders. As a result instead of being charged with a misdemeanor in the justice court, will face a charge of contempt of court and be before Judge Kent for trial.

The water company has received numerous complaints during the past week of pilferings along the Grand canal and it is probable the contempt proceedings will be aimed at the property owners under this system who have violated the trust imposed upon them. No definite information regarding the threatened arrests could be secured last evening, but it is probable the developments of today will bring forth much of public interest.
