

GERMANS GRANTED UNTIL 9:30 P.M. TO FULLY

Give Seven Day Extension at Request of German Representatives—Advanced Plea That They Required More Time to Formulate Arguments of Importance—Statement Comes From Berlin That the German Cabinet is Unwilling That Germany Sign the Treaty—Claim is Advanced That the Document Would Involve Economic Destruction.

A period of seven days of grace has been extended to Germany by the representatives of the entente and associated governments to which the German peace plenipotentiaries may conclude their study of the peace treaty and formulate comments on the various clauses as they desire.

The extension of time, which originally was to have expired at noon on Thursday, was granted at the request of the Germans, who advanced the plea that more time was required in order that they might formulate arguments of such importance to the entente and allied governments as to be worthy of the attention of the plenipotentiaries of the latter. It was stated that the original date adhered to it would be impossible to complete them. Thus the time has been set forward to Thursday, May 29.

Efforts made in Germany to ascertain even the gist of the contents of the proposed reply of Germany have been without reward. Reports have it, however, that lengthy notes dealing with Alsace Lorraine, the east German frontier, the territory occupied by the allied forces, and the method of its payment are to be dealt with.

Almost simultaneously with the request for more time, plenipotentiaries of the German cabinet have issued a statement of the foremost statesmen in Germany that the sealing of the compact would spell the ruin of the former empire.

The old ground that signing the document as it stands would involve the economic destruction, political dismemberment and moral degradation of the country is adhered to.

President Wilson's fourteen points for peace are demanded by the statement as the basis of the peace desired. It being asserted that Germany accepted these terms and laid down her arms believing that they would be carried out.

Not More Than \$1,000 to be Received From Any Individual.

Washington, May 21.—Chairman Hays of the republican national committee announced today no contribution of more than one thousand dollars would be received from anyone for the financing of the coming republican campaign and launched a plan of county-wide small individual subscriptions.

The new plan marks the passing of great contributions from corporations and individuals, but the subject of attack by the republican party's political opponents. The new plan, Mr. Hays announced, involves the decentralization of money raising into the very smallest contributions from the smallest units of territory. The chairman will outline the new plan in detail at a conference here tomorrow and Friday with the republican state chairmen.

Supporters of Susan B. Anthony Amendment Won by Vote of 304 to 89, Fourteen More Than Would Have Been Necessary Had All Members Been Present—House Leaders of Both Parties in Debate Urged Favorable Action—Opposition Came From Southern Democrats and New England Republicans—Supporters Have Arranged to Carry Their Fight Into the Senate.

Washington, May 21.—National suffrage for women was endorsed by the house of representatives for the second time today when the Susan B. Anthony amendment resolution was adopted by a vote of 304 to 89. Supporters of the measure immediately arranged to carry the fight to the senate.
