

Midget Smith Gets Decision Over Herman

New York, Dec. 22.—Midget Smith of New York was given the judges' decision over Pete Herman, former heavyweight champion at the end of the 15-round bout in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Herman, who apparently was not at his best, employed wide open tactics against Smith. He fared well in the earlier rounds but his carelessness led him into many tight places, and he was worsted in the hard exchanges.

In the third round Smith cut Herman in and out with hard rights. The New Orleans boy rallied in the tenth, but he had fared and his blows had little effect on his opponent.

Herman weighed 155 1/2 pounds and Smith 115 1/2.

Gene Tunney, light heavyweight champion of the A. K. F., knocked out Eddie O'Hara, a former sparring partner of Dempsey, in the sixth round of their preliminary bout. Tunney weighed 155 1/2 pounds, O'Hara 167 1/2.

Jack Tennant, claimant of the Canadian heavyweight title, received the judges' decision over A. Roth in eight rounds. Dave Rosenberg, New York middleweight, received the judges' decision over Jimmy Dax, Portland, Oregon, in eight rounds.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET WAS IRREGULAR

New York, Dec. 22.—Tendencies in the financial market today were irregular and preliminary from the fact that there was a low of the standard or representative issues showed more than casual support.

Trading in most other respects was characteristic of the holiday season. Further heavy selling was noted in certain speculative issues, presumably to adjust income tax issues. The investment inquiry was keen, however, as evidenced by the steady sale of new offerings, including Louisville and Nashville bonds.

Industrial continued to be depressed by adverse trade conditions, more cutting of prices being reported in steel and iron products. Oils were under constant pressure and with motor, junior steel, coppers, chemicals, textiles and tobacco registered extreme reactions of one to four points.

Equipments, especially American Locomotive and General Electric, were about the only stocks in which the short interest seemed it advisable to cover contracts. The sluggish course of rails other than western reflected further neglect of those issues. Sales amounted to 799,800 shares.

The money market was inclined to relax, although interior banks drew upon their local reserves for home requirements. Call loans opened at 6 per cent, but moved to five in the afternoon, with private offerings on good collateral at 4 1/2 per cent.

In the bond market the striking feature was the heaviness of foreign issues, notably French municipalities, which broke sharply upon relatively small sales. The domestic bond list, including Liberty bonds and calls, was irregularly lower. Total sales, (par value) amounted to \$1,750,000.
