HOW HUGHES ADDRESS WAS DIGESTED IN WASHINGTON

Washington, Dec. 29.—Appointment of American financiers to sit upon a commission to investigate the economic conditions of the world, Secretary Hughes in his address at New Haven would be on nomination of the government. If the proposal for this method of adjusting the reparations dispute was accepted, it would be a great advance expressed authoritatively in White House circles in connection with Mr. Hughes' remarks.
