BEFORE SANTIAGO 14 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK. Many of Returned Soldiers Cared For in Connecticut Hospitals.

This week recalls the surrender of Santiago de Cuba, 14 years ago. Although the actual operations around Santiago began on June 23, 1898, when General Henry W. Lawton's division landed at Daiquiri, about 18 miles east of Santiago, the actual operations of the city did not take place until about a month later, July 4.
