Thomas Preston. Thomas Preston, one of the prosperous retired business men and property owners of New Haven, died Saturday evening at his residence, 183 Franklin street.

He was a native of Ireland, was born June 20, 1816, in the County Fermanagh, and was the son of Thomas Preston and Sarah Kelley. He remained at home attending school and helping his parents until he was 21, when he crossed the Atlantic and located at St. Johns, New Brunswick, where he learned his trade of ship carpenter. After serving his apprenticeship, Mr. Preston went to New York, and later removed to New Orleans, La.

In 1841 he came to New Haven to see a friend, and being well pleased with the locality he settled in this city, and followed the trade of ship carpenter and joiner for several years. During the war he was Commodore Gregory, a friend of Mr. Preston, induced him to locate in Boston, and while there he worked on the famous "Merrimack."

After 15 months he went to the New York navy yard, where his skill obtained him employment for five years, under Admiral Foote, a friend of Commodore Gregory. Feeling, however, that New Haven suited him better as a place of residence, Mr. Preston removed to this city and until his retirement followed his trade as ship carpenter.

The funeral will take place to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock from St. Patrick's church.

Late Thomas Fitch Rowland. Editor of the Journal and Courier: In the death of Mr. Thomas Fitch Rowland we have to record the passing away of another former New Haven citizen. While engaged in an extensive business and living in the metropolis, he never forgot the home of his childhood, or his former acquaintances. When severe bereavements came to him he bore them with the Christian attitude instilled in the make up of his youth, and which never forsook him. He has been gathered to his rest, but there are hosts to-day who will rise up and bless his memory.
