3 KILLED IN GAS BLAST

Bow, N. H., Jan. 17.—Three per-

 sons are believed to have been killed
 by the force of the blast. Mrs. Curtis

REDUCES CHURCH DEBT

Rev. Patrick Daly Reads Encouraging

Statement of St. Joseph's Parish to
 Congregation Yesterday.

Rev. Patrick Daly, pastor of St. Jo-
 seph's church, presented his annual
 report at the various masses at the
 church yesterday. The debt on the
 church was reduced by \$4,000. The
 income during the year was \$18,740.88
 and the expenses amounted to \$14,
 586.74, leaving a balance of \$154.14.
 The spiritual report showed there are
 1,000 attendants at Easter duty.
 Twelve deaths occurred during the
 past year, and there were 30 mar-
 riages, 27 Catholic couples and three
 mixed marriages. Eighty-eight boys
 and girls received first communion,
 and 97 infants and two adults were
 baptized. There are 329 children in
 the parochial school. The parish has
 2,312 souls of which 1,662 are English
 speaking and 650 Italians.
